See, on celestial plains our camps are set! Strike and press on, brave Comrade, as you must


By this sign conquer—'Do thou ne'er forget.'"



THE BELIEF OF A KNIGHT TEMPLAR



THE BELIEF OF A KNIGHT TEMPLAR

In the darkest period of medievalism, when the Cathedrals of Christendom were threatened with destruction, there arose as defenders the valiant Knights of the Temple, men consecrated to the service of the Master and the protection of His followers. "Poor fellow-soldiers of Jesus Christ," they termed themselves, those nine noble champions who banded themselves together for such hallowed ends. Hugo De Pagains, De Payens, according to modern spelling, was their leader. The initial Crusade was undertaken with Godfrey DeBouillon, who was thoroughly informed as to the enemies who had persecuted the pilgrims visiting Jerusalem.

Their mission began in 1113 and comprised guarding the route from the sea to the holy city. Reports of the achievements spread over Europe, with the result of increasing greatly the number of recruits. Baldwin II, King of Jerusalem, assigned them quarters in the Temple and a new impetus was felt. Adherents multiplied by hundreds and thousands—the best and most cultured gladly entered the ranks. Possessions were acquired. Pope Honorius II appointed the white mantle as the especial garb in contradistinction from the Hospitallers or Knights of St. John, who wore black. Pope Eugenius III authorized the use of the Red Cross, the symbol of sacrifice. The Council of Trayes, composed of the Bishops of the Church, promulgated in 1128 the seventy-two rules of discipline, which have ever remained the working basis.

So strong did the body become that fear and enmity appeared, ripening ere long into bitter persecution. Accused of treachery, twelve were gibbeted in 1166. But when the Turks again uprose, the valor of the proscribed order was once more in demand and their foes were glad to secure shelter behind their banners. How bravely they withstood Saladin. Odo de St. Amand, Grand Master, was doomed to life imprisonment. Arnold de Torrage, his successor, perished endeavoring to awaken another Crusade. Gerard de Riderfoot, next in command, was defeated in the great battle of 1187, barely escaping with his life. Jerusalem was retaken. Then the Templars rallied, laid siege to Acre, and after two years struggle it capitulated. Nearby they speedily erected

Castle Pilgrim, their most famous and impregnable stronghold.

The dissension in Christian ranks pertains to the sway of Frederick. The Knights of the Temple, the Hospitallers and Teutonic Knights were all in opposition. The battle of Gaza in 1244 was an overwhelming defeat. Safed saw the massacre of six hundred members of the order and as many women and chil-Acre fell. William de Beaujean, the Grand Master, was dren. killed. Cyprus opened its doors as a place of refuge. Dispersed and defeated in the Holy Land, Philip the Fair coveted its possessions in Europe. Pope Clement, a willing tool of the monarch, summoned Jacques De Molay in 1305 to a council ostensibly to inaugurate a new Crusade. He was received with open arms by the treacherous Philip, only subsequently by his command to be cast into prison. With him, one hundred and forty-six companions were arrested.

Trials and tortures followed. The Pope presided at Vienna, but refused a hearing to the deputies sent to defend their comrades in chains and incarcerated them also. Executions followed. The Knights conducted themselves so grandly that, to the chagrin of the Pope and King, public opinion turned in their favor. The Ecclesiastical Tribunal in Paris in 1311 confronted De Molay and Guy de Maupassant, Commander of Normandy, with their alleged confessions. Solemnly and with dramatic impressiveness, in the courtyard in front of Notre Dame, they denied these and spoke words of rarest praise for their order. The Tribunal hesitated to pronounce sentence, but Philip, at vespers the next evening, had the two prisoners taken to an island in the Seine near his palace, where in the twilight they were consumed to ashes over fires of charcoal. This awful crime dismembered the organization. With possessions confiscated, a formal edict issued by a private Papal Consistory abolishing their meetings, it seemed as if existence was ended forever. Yet the dispersed companions found a shelter in the lodges of Operative Masonry and from such benignant surroundings there was a revival of the primitive fraternity in England in 1740 and in America in 1780. Its progress since then has never waned. Today four hundred and fifty thousand subscribe to its tenets and stand for its expanding fame. Never was its future more bright and its avenues for usefulness more obviously perceptible.

The elements of such Knighthood are worthy of scrutiny. Courage is implied at the start. St. Paul's declaration, "I have fought a good fight," is always in force. "Half priest, half soldier" was the Templar's ancient aspect. The old-time precept each candidate heard sounding in his ears: "You who desire to become a Knight must pursue a new course of life. Devotedly you must watch in prayer, avoid sins of pride and idleness. You must defend the Church, widows and orphans, and with boldness succor the distressed." The impassioned cry upon the assumption of the Cross was, "It is the will of God, it is the will of God." The shout of triumph when victorious was, "Non nobis, Domine, non nobis, sed nomini Tuo da gloriam." The charge was made repeatedly to the words "Exsurgat Deus." The hymns in war and peace were the "Gloria in Excelsis" and the "Te Deum." How striking the heroism of Renaud de Chattillon, who scorned in captivity to purchase life by apostasy and was beheaded by Saladin! What daring in Jakeline de Malliacus, who, in combat near Tiberiad, rushed boldly into the midst of the Saracens, one against a thousand, because, as the old chronicler asserts, "Mori pro Christo non timuit"-he feared not to die for Christ.

The teaching is drawn entirely from the Incarnation and the Atonement. In the words of the Introit for Holy Week, sung in sweet cadence in every Preceptory or Chapel, "We ought to glory in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, in whom is our salvation, life and resurrection, by whom we have been saved and delivered." The legend was upheld: "Non est salus animae, nec spes aeternae vitae, nisi in Cruce"—there is no help to the soul nor hope of eternal life save in the Cross. The symbol of grace ever bore the inscription, "In Hoc Signo Vinces," borrowed from the Labarum of Constantine. They constantly realized the aptness of Spencer's lines:

"A gentle Knight was pricking o'er the plain,

Clad in mighty arms and silver shield,

And on his breast a bloody cross he bore

In dear remembrance of his dying Lord

For whose sweet sake that glorious badge he wore

And, dead or living, ever Him adored;

Upon his shield the like was also scored

For sovereign hope which in His help he had."

The motto that governed every onset was, "First to attack and last to retreat."

With such historic data every Templar should justify his vow of allegiance to Jesus. We are living in a period of much unbelief. In converse, books and periodicals the virus of doubt is insinuated. The point of assault is the Person of Christ. If His hold can be weakened. His claims reduced to human ideals, the end is accomplished. With the citadel despoiled, the whole country of faith must surrender. Our duty is clear and unmistakable. Against such conception, this negative assumption of mere morality, this weak and vitiated discipleship, the whole strength of our mighty order must be cast. Christ is not a mere man. For such a conception the intrepid six hundred at Safed would not have accepted willing destruction. Not Ecce Homo, but Ecce Deus is the witness to all confused and warring minds. This is the victory which overcometh the world, and in this trust there is everlasting life.

Our conviction as Knights Templar is well expressed by Randolph McKim. "The dilemma is inevitable; either He is what He professed to be, the Christ, the Son of God, or else He is a man who can no longer be followed as an example or trusted as a teacher. But let any inquirer consider that dilemma in the light of the unparalleled moral teaching and His peerless life and character and then say which is the more reasonable conclusion that such a man, such a teacher, such a sublime and royal personage, was after all a mad dreamer, or that His claims were founded on truth, that He was all He declared Himself to be, that we are here in the presence of a superhuman life and superhuman wisdom, and that this Man of Nazareth is indeed the Christ, the Son of the living God."

It requires character to assume this attitude before cavil and criticism. The superficial will demur, the shallow sneer. But one look at the early testimony, so oblivious of earthly consequence, will suffice to loosen the tongue and marshal the arguments for complete victory. It is comparatively easy to speak in opposition to that subscription which meant once instantaneous destruction. Yet as the blood spent then went toward the creation of the harvest now seen, so like consistency today will bear impress for the future. The symbolic aspect of the Cross

must lend continued assistance. Its use implies perfect surrender of the will, home, friends, wealth, country, even life, for the cause so sacredly espoused. It means the subjugation of self and sin, the discomfiture of enemies far and wide. The blood-red banner of salvation-who could be a craven beholding its exalted character at the head of the host? It is not the emblem of fraud. Superstition recoils from it, oppression shrinks abashed and base passions flee away. It recalls Gethsemane, Pilate's judgment-hall and Golgotha. Beholding it, determination arises to support it at all hazards, for final radiance will illumine it and the halo of ineffable glory crown it above. The scenes where it has proved invincible are the mightiest known. The past has naught superior, the present must emphasize its worth, and the future record its final achievement. It is a supreme delight to set forth these facts when contemplating the Savior's bed of torture as the proof that humanity can plead such sufficiency before the throne. "Cruce dum spiro fido"—"Whilst I breathe I trust in the Cross" -is the old-time motto, bathing the Cross in splendor, and may well incite every Commandery to deeper consecration.

Stability as a feature of Knighthood is emphasized in the reverence paid to the Bible. What a book it is for man's inspection. Publishers tell us that only one volume in a thousand lives five years, and but one in twenty thousand lasts a century. Hundreds annually go down in the sea of literature. Yet here is a series of records compassing tremendous epochs, known familiarly in the humblest dwellings everywhere. The printing presses never cease adding to the circulation. The most popular of modern writers, whose editions succeed each other with astonishing rapidity, cannot cope with this ancient religious classic. The wonder augments when you put it side by side with other treasures of by-gone days. Fifteen hundred years after Herodotus there was but one copy of his history in existence; like insignificance attended Plato after twelve hundred years. But after a thousand years there were fifty manuscripts of the Scriptures extant, the three best copies sedulously guarded by the Greek, Roman and Anglican Churches. The rescue of some of these from their remote surroundings was peculiarly romantic. Tischendorf visited a monastery at Mt. Sinai and discovered amid the contents of a waste-basket, used for kindling, a most valuable copy. It took fifteen years of later

diplomacy to complete the copy from the obtuse and ignorant custodians.

The Bible is an unvarying book. The Old Testament prior to the birth of Christ contained thirty-nine portions, and they are there still; the New Testament as first collated comprised twentyseven, the modern prototype no more. The early heretics attest the reliability of our canon; Marcion gives a Catalogue identical with the Church. The translation now reaches three hundred languages and there are three hundred million copies in use. The Bible is the best seller still and eclipses all other forms of learning or fiction.

In spite of all the revolutions and changes of the centuries not one writer is missing. Of ancient books this alone is exceptional. Of Livy the first and second decades are lost, of Pliny twenty books of history, almost all of Meander, 110 copies of Plautus. of Euripides only 19 remain, of 100 dramas of Aeschylus all are gone but 7, of Varro's 1,700 biographies of Romans not one exists. 30 books of Tacitus are lost, all of Quintilian's treaties upon Eloquence, while Berosus' history has completely vanished. What an amazing summary of obliterated greatness! How comes it where hundreds of favorites have passed from sight, the Bible only remains intact? The question is bound up with the being of God. If that is explainable only upon supernatural grounds, none the less also is Holy Writ. The divine life inbreathed means imperishability. Preserved by divine fiat, human decimation is impossible. We rightly honor its pages. As a distinct Christian order we oppose Atheism and Agnosticism. Whether we reckon progress by eras Patriarchal, Jewish and Christian, periods Prehistoric, Ancient, Medieval and Modern, we attest the oversight of Providence working out the best ends of creation for "the life that now is and for that which is to come." The entire system of the Mosaic dispensation as annunciating the foundation of religious dogma is under inspection. The peculiar people are prepared for the advent of the promised Messiah. Special reference is had to the Cross and the Crucifixion of Jesus. Here all mysteries are completed and justified. Thus the priceless volume of Revelation is the basis upon which instructions turn and we promote their dissemination by every means in our power. In the midst of blatant assumption, base trifling, fancied superi-

ority holding the Bible at a distance and prating of freedom from superstition, it is encouraging to find men of fraternal obligation reading their title clear in its blessed promises. Such a view resembles a pool by the ocean lifting its circumscribed domain in utter contempt for the great sea beyond. One tempest sets such folly at rest. So, with man, a single storm which experience creates, if rightly received, conquers his littleness and stills his quibblings forever.

The sword of the Templar symbolizes fidelity. When raised on high in support of the Creed it denotes the valiant defenders of divine truth.

Definiteness in conviction marks every stage of our ritual. We believe in the Triune God. Says an authoritative writer: "Without a firm belief in the doctrine of the Trinity, there never would have been any order of Knights Templar in the world. It was the very basis of the ancient order and continues to be so up to the present time. The degree of the Temple holds up to the view of its members the Crucifixion, Death, Resurrection and Ascension of Jesus, Lord and King of Glory and Prince of Peace, teaching the divinity of Christ and Trinity of the Godhead. Need I add, the object, the end, the result of the great speculation of antiquity was the ultimate annihilation of evil and the restoration of man to his first state, by a Redeemer, a Messiah, a Christos —the incarnate Word."

There is no veiled skepticism, no mere religion of modern construction, no substitute of ethical generalization for a deposit of doctrine, substantiated by texts at every stage. In an exultant spirit the neophyte comes forward to be invested with his degrees. He knows that he is to stand for these virtues against all of the glittering generalities, intended to subvert the elect. He is to be the stalwart advocate of that which is abiding because mindful of "the name above every name." His duty is defined in the old description, "a very Knight and servant of Jhesu Cryste." The earliest memorial stated that the defense of religion became the office and pride of the old nobility and the order of knighthood. The duty of a Knight was to maintain the Catholic faith. "The Cross of Christ was no sooner lifted up as a standard than all Europe was united in a bond of brotherhood to testify their love for the Redeemer of mankind and to protect from insult and

injury the persecuted servants of their Savior."

The deeds flowering from such stock are manifold. The objects of Templarism have always been marked. Innocence has been sheltered, widows and orphans tended, suffering and disaster relieved. Through all the ages of history no great extremity has failed to find a generous response. The disruptions of the Civil and World War, the yellow fever scourge at New Orleans and Memphis, the Chicago fire, the famine in India and Ireland, the earthquakes at San Francisco and San Diego, the flood at Galveston, all have been borne munificently in mind. There has been an unvarying exemplification of generosity. Added to which have been the countless individual cases that have deepened sympathy at home. Without stint, not diving into particulars, asking simply to be shown the appropriate object, this has been the mode in which benefaction has been put forth. Such unostentatious giving has done the world good. The precept to conceal from "the left hand what the right hand doeth" has been as closely followed as possible. This precept has rested like a diadem upon the brow of the order. Were there no other recommendations this would entitle us to universal praise.

Courtesy has ever animated. Chivalry that animates Knighthood dictates a demeanor of constant gentleness. Affable reflection, geniality, unvarying kindliness, the willingness to expend self in doing a favor, these principles have ever dominated. It is the model of true gentlemanliness. As the accolade in the middle ages dubbed one to live apart for the holiest purposes, so the right to carry a title still must indicate that mood cherishing virtue in continuous delight. St. Francis de Sales said once: "How carefully we should cherish the little virtues which spring up at the foot of the Cross." When asked what he meant, he replied: "Humility, patience, meekness, benignity, bearing one another's burdens, condescension, softness of heart, cheerfulness, cordiality, compassion, forgiving injuries, simplicity, candor-all, in short, of that sort of little virtues." They, like unobtrusive violets, love the shade; like them, are sustained by dew; and though, like them, they make little show, they shed a sweet odor on all around. It is the familiarity with great themes, the practice of great motives, the handling of great tokens, the upstoring of great precepts, that unconsciously molds and refines the whole being.

Making prominent such things will give to this exemplary fraternity conspicuous distinction throughout the world.

The belief of a Knight Templar embraces a most wondrous compendium. It reaches from highest heaven to the depths of earth. God in His three-fold relation of Father, Son and Holy Ghost. Man as physical, moral, intellectual and spiritual. The world as sentient, rational and progressive. This century as open to instruction and amelioration, our country as worthy of the most enlightened culture and the best practical religion. Our homes as entitled to the manliest reverence, charity, brotherly sentiment and tender emotion. In short, every thing enduring in faith and inspiring in act.

With such interests upheld, there is small wonder at the width of adherence. Kings, princes, jurists, literati, the noble-minded of every phase of being can unite splendidly upon such a platform. Added greatness pertains to each station by due observance of such pure and stimulating incentives. We do not wonder that the Church is especially drawn towards our Order, because every inclination compels closest union. Bishop Perry, former Grand Prelate of Iowa, says: "The dogmatic teachings of true Templary are squared with the words of that ancient landmark, God's Holy Word. These lessons of duty are in our modern Templarism to be symbolized in language and carried out in life. The Templar must be a Christian, initiated in Holy Baptism into the Church of our Lord Jesus Christ, and, if consistent, should remember the words of his Master: "This do-Take and eat my Body and drink my Blood-"in remembrance of Me." Founded on the Christian religion is our oft repeated profession, and, if Christ like, nothing Christian is foreign to it. "For the practice of the Christian virtues" is our avowed object in affiliating. How pure, how holy, how upright, how consistent, should be our lives. Reverence and humility should be ours when engaged in Templar duty. Our vows and profession should have a deep meaning, for they are made with prayer to the unseen God-they are vowed and pledged with every accompaniment of reverent looking unto Him who is invisible."


We bid you ponder this beautiful epitome of the approved standard. Emulate our sacred past, make the present eventful and the future sublime. Let all that you do fully prepare for



HISTORICAL DATA

The initial movement which led to the introduction of Templar Masonry into this state had its origin among members of the Masonic Fraternity in Ohio, Dearborn, Franklin, Jefferson and Switzerland Counties in southeastern Indiana, which with the counties of Montgomery, Butler, and Hamilton in Ohio constituted a territorial district of the Methodist Episcopal Church under the supervision of Rev. William H. Raper as the Presiding Elder.

In 1846, during some of the conferences of that religious denomination which were held at Aurora, Rising Sun, Madison and other river towns, many Masons who were also Methodists were brought together. This meeting of Masons was the occasion and these Masons formed the nucleus for the organization of Raper Commandery.

The records show that Rev. Mr. Raper received the Orders of Knighthood in Reed Encampment, No. 6, of Dayton, Ohio, in 1846, and that it was he who first suggested to other Masons the advisability of establishing an Encampment of Knights Templar

in the Hoosier State. At different Methodist Conferences the propriety of doing so was discussed and finally it was agreed that they should make such an effort. The duty of obtaining at least the requisite number of eligible applicants to apply for a Dispensation fell upon Abel C. Pepper of Rising Sun. After much correspondence with other Masons and some delay an application was prepared and forwarded to the Most Eminent Grand Master of the General Grand Encampment, who resided at Columbus, Ohio, praying for a Dispensation with full authority to proceed, with the understanding that, should favorable action be taken and a Dispensation be issued, a meeting of the petitioners would be held in the city of Indianapolis at the earliest practicable date. After learning of this and of a contemplated visit by Rev. Mr. Raper to the capitol city, the hearty cooperation of the Masons in other sections of the state was secured.

Sir William H. Raper had been elected Grand Commander of Reed Encampment, No. 6, of Dayton. Sir Samuel Reed was a member of Cincinnati Encampment, No. 3, and at the time was Grand Lecturer of the Grand Encampment and of other York Rite Masonic bodies of Ohio. Both had established reputations for proficiency in esoteric work. They visited Indianapolis during the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge, F. and A. M., of Indiana in 1847 and discussed the subject with representatives in attendance from the forty-nine lodges scattered throughout the State, and received the assurance of the fullest cooperation in the contemplated Encampment should permission be obtained to establish one. The location was made subject to the wishes of the Most Eminent Grand Master. These two Sir Knights reported to the petitioners that upon the recommendation and approval of Encampments No. 3 of Cincinnati and No. 6 of Dayton a Dispensation would be issued, and that the time for instituting the first Encampment in Indiana would be about May 15th, during the week of the Grand Lodge meeting of 1848. At the appointed time the petitioners and a few Sir Knights from Ohio and Illinois, in addition to Sirs William H. Raper and Samuel Reed, met at Indianapolis and the records of Raper Encampment, No. 1, contain the following information:

"In the spring of the year 1848 certain Knights Templar, who were residents of Indiana, that is to say Sir Abel C. Pepper, Sir

Greeting ;

> Facsimile of Dispensation Granted By General Grand Encampment, K. T., U. S. A. May 14, 1848.

James H. Pepper, Sir James Sterratt of Rising Sun, Sir Isaac Bartlett and Sir Frederick Fitch of Logansport, Sir Richard Sopris of Aurora, Sir Caleb Schmidlapp of Madison, Sir Benjamin Taylor Kavanaugh and Sir Francis King of Indianapolis. and Sir James W. Weaver of Aurora, being impressed with the great truths that it hath pleased Almighty God in the creation of man to endow him with intellectual, moral and social powers, thereby fitting him for the cultivation in an eminent degree of 'Peace on Earth and Good Will to Man,' and that the moral and religious teachings of the Orders of Christian Knighthood being derived from the sublime teachings of the Holy Scriptures, all breathe a spirit of brotherly love, enjoining upon its members the relief of the distressed and the defenseless, the Virtues of Faith, Hope, and Charity, combined with Justice, Fortitude, and Mercy; and believing that the time had fully come for the establishment of an Encampment of Knights Templar in Indiana, thereby to diffuse more widely the Heavenly precepts of our Holy religion, which are so forcibly inculcated in the rituals of Christian Knighthood, the above named Knights Templar jointly petitioned Sir William B. Hubbard, the Most Eminent Grand Master of the General Grand Encampment of Knights Templar for the United States of America, resident in Columbus, in the State of Ohio, praying for letters of Dispensation, authorizing them to open an Encampment of Knights Templar and the Appendant Orders in the above named State and City of Indianapolis.

"And afterward, on the 17th day of May, 1848, a convention of the following Knights Templar was held at the residence of Governor James Whitcomb in the city of Indianapolis—that is to say: Sir Abel C. Pepper, Sir James H. Pepper, and Sir James Sterratt of Rising Sun, Sir Caleb Schmidlapp of Madison, Sir Isaac Bartlett of Logansport, Sir Francis King and Sir Benjamin T. Kavanaugh of Indianapolis, Sir Henry C. Lawrence of Lafayette, Sir Seth Beers of Madison, Sir William H. Hacker of Shelbyville, Sir William H. Raper, Grand Commander of Reed Encampment, No. 6, of Dayton, Ohio, and Sir Samuel Reed, Grand Lecturer of the Grand Encampment of Ohio. Sir Abel C. Pepper presided and Sir James Sterratt acted as secretary of the convention.

"And thereupon Sir Abel C. Pepper reported to the convention "that in the discharge of the duties heretofore assigned to him he had by correspondence with Grand Commander Sir William H. Raper and with his valuable, prompt and timely assistance, and the recommendation at his instance of Reed Encampment, No. 6, of Dayton, Ohio, procured from the Most Excellent Grand Master of the General Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the United States of America, a Dispensation,' which was thereupon ordered to be entered on the records of the convention, in words and figures following, that is to say:

"'To All Whom It May Concern-Greeting:

"'Whereas a petition of sundry Knights Templar in the city of Indianapolis, State of Indiana, praying that a Dispensation may be granted them to open and hold an Encampment of Knights Templar and Council of Appendant Orders at the city of Indianapolis in the county of Marion and the State of Indiana has been presented to me for consideration; and whereas it appears to me that the prayers of the petitioners ought to be granted; now Know Ye, that I, William B. Hubbard, General Grand Master of the General Grand Encampment of Knights Templar for the United States, by virtue of the power in me vested, do grant this Dispensation to Sir Knights Abel C. Pepper, Isaac Bartlett, Frederick Fitch, James W. Weaver, James Sterratt, Richard Sopris, James H. Pepper, Caleb Schmidlapp, Francis King, and Benjamin Taylor Kavanaugh, the petitioners aforesaid, and to their associates and successors and empower them to open and hold an Encampment of Knights Templar and Council of Appendant Orders at the place aforesaid, to be called and distinguished by the name of Raper Encampment, No. 1, and in each of the several Orders to confer the several degrees thereof upon such person or persons possessing the requisite qualifications, as they may think proper.

"'And I do by these presents appoint Sir Abel C. Pepper as Grand Commander, Sir Isaac Bartlett as Generalissimo, and Sir Jeremiah Frederick Fitch as Captain-General, with continuance to them of the said powers and privileges until the second Tuesday of September in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty, and no longer; Provided, nevertheless, that the said officers and members of said Encampment pay due respect to our said

General Grand Encampment and to the Constitution and Edicts thereof, and in no way remove the ancient landmarks of our Order; otherwise this Dispensation and all therein contained to be void and of no effect.

"Given under my hand and seal at the city of Columbus, State of Ohio, this fourteenth day of May, in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and forty-eight.

[SEAL] (Signed) WILLIAM B. HUBBARD.'

"Be it further remembered that the name of said Encampment as set forth on the Dispensation was proposed and unanimously agreed to by the Sir Knights thereof who were in attendance in honor of the Reverend Sir Knight William H. Raper, Grand Commander of Reed Encampment, No. 6, in the State of Ohio, and as a testimonial of their affection for his person and esteem for his character.

"Sir Abel C. Pepper also reported that the services of Sir Knights William H. Raper of Dayton, and Samuel Reed of Cincinnati, Ohio, had been procured to aid in the organization of this Encampment, who were both present.

The convention then adjourned sine die."

Shortly after the closing of the convention on Wednesday, May 17th, the same Sir Knights, present at that meeting, again assembled at the residence of Governor Whitcomb, the use of which he had generously tendered for the purpose of holding the first meeting of Raper Encampment U. D.

The building was situated on the lot at the northwest corner of Illinois and Market Streets and was the property of the State of Indiana and known as the "Governor's Mansion." It was torn down early in 1865, and the "Miller Block" and "Cyclorama Building" were erected. Later these buildings were removed and the present Traction Terminal Building was erected which now occupies the site.

The Encampment was opened in form with Rev. Sir Knight William H. Raper presiding as Grand Commander and acting as the representative of the Most Eminent Grand Master of the General Grand Encampment for organization purposes. He was assisted by the following named Sir Knights acting in the various official stations: Rev. Benjamin Taylor Kavanaugh, Generalissimo; Abel C. Pepper, Captain-General; Samuel Reed, Senior

Warden (Cincinnati Encampment, No. 3, of Ohio); James H. Pepper, Junior Warden; Isaac Bartlett, Treasurer; James Sterratt, Recorder; Caleb Schmidlapp, Standard Bearer; Henry C. Lawrence, Sword Bearer (Apollo Encampment No. 1 of Illinois); William Hacker, Warden (Cincinnati Encampment No. 3, of Ohio); Francis King, Sentinel.

The acting Grand Commander presented a written proxy authorizing him to act for the Most Eminent Grand Master in all matters directly relating to the organization, as set forth in the Dispensation. This was recognized and affirmed by the avowal of all Sir Knights present.

Sir Benjamin T. Kavanaugh immediately thereafter offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

"WHEREAS, certain citizens, resident in Indiana, being Knights Templar who hold in esteem and veneration the precepts of religion, and who are especially desirous of promoting Justice, supporting Truth, sustaining Rational Liberty, encouraging Sobriety, suppressing Profaneness, cherishing the virtues of Charity, Hospitality and Humility, and of diffusing the sublime principles of Universal Benevolence, have established at Indianapolis in said State under requisite authority for that purpose first obtained an Encampment of Knights Templar known as Raper Encampment, No. 1; now

"Therefore, the more effectively to promote good discipline, harmony and concert of action in furtherance of the laudable objects above referred to, and for their future government, they do make and adopt the following By-Laws:" Then follows the original code of by-laws in full which were adopted, but reprint here is deemed unnecessary. However, brief notice of some of the provisions are given:

The first article provides that "the Knights Templar whose names appear in the petition for a Dispensation, or upon whom one or more Orders of Knighthood have been or shall hereafter be conferred in this Encampment, or who shall be admitted to membership in the manner subsequently provided, shall be deemed members."

The fee for the Order of the Red Cross was fixed at \$12.00; for the Order of the Temple and Knights of Malta at \$8.00; a

total of \$20.00; for affiliation, \$1.00; contributions for expenses or annual dues were \$1.00.

Provision was made for the reference of a petition to a committee and their report thereon before balloting, as at present, but a provision provided that "in cases of emergency which admit of no delay and by unanimous consent an applicant may file his petition and receive the Orders on one and the same day."

The time for the annual election of officers was fixed to occur at the regular stated conclave in April of each succeeding year, but this provision seems to have been disregarded because of the many difficulties encountered—remoteness of residence, absence of a constitutional number necessary, and other causes—until after the Encampment had received its Charter and was duly constituted.

The By-Laws were signed by nine of the applicants for the Dispensation.

Richard Sopris being the exception who does not appear to have been eligible, his dimit not being in evidence. He was a member of Cincinnati Encampment, No. 3, with which he continued until October, 1852, when he received a dimit.

The first petitions presented for the Orders of Knighthood were those of James Whitcomb of Indianapolis, David G. Rabb and Alexander C. Downey of Rising Sun, C. I. Hand of Indianapolis, and Thomas H. Gilmore.

The Encampment then adjourned until 7:30 o'clock A. M. Thursday, May 18th, when, resuming the order of business, the following resolution, presented by Sir Abel C. Pepper, was adopted:

"WHEREAS, Several petitions have been presented and many more are hourly expected from Companions residing at a distance who are in attendance at the annual communication of the Grand Lodge and the Grand Chapter of Indiana, who are all well and favorably known to members of this Encampment; and

"WHEREAS, Sir William H. Raper, Grand Commander of Reed Encampment, Dayton, Ohio, and Sir Samuel Reed, Grand Lecturer of the Grand Encampment of Ohio, are in attendance for the purpose of assisting in the organization of this Encampment and of imparting instructions;

"*Resolved*, That we deem this such a case of emergency as will admit of no delay, and that the several committees have leave to report instanter."

The several petitioners were then elected upon the recommendation of the committees appointed and, being in waiting, were introduced in due form and created Knights of the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross.

During the following days sessions were held on the 19th, 20th, 22nd, 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th and 29th and a number of other petitioners were elected and created Knights of the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross.

To avoid repetition of names, routine of work and other details of inducting petitioners into the Encampment, a tabulation of all who were at that time or who have since been enrolled, with proper dates indicated in so far as they can be traced, is furnished in another part of this work. (See page 173.)

On Saturday evening, May 20th, the Encampment reassembled and James Whitcomb, then Governor of the State of Indiana, the first petitioner for the Order of Knighthood, who had received the Red Cross degree, was created a Knight Templar in the most impressive and solemn form possible with the limited facilities.

The last petition presented for consideration before the close of this first conclave, which covered a period of twelve days, the sessions adjourning from day to day, was on May 29th, and the record reads: "The petition of Rev. C. A. Foster of Evansville was presented, the fee being remitted by unanimous vote, and being a minister of the Gospel and far from home, he was invested with the Orders of Knighthood at once."

This concluded the work of the first meeting which covered a period of twelve days. Including the original nine, thirty-one Knights had been enrolled as members.

Previous to closing the Encampment, Sir Abel C. Pepper, the Grand Commander designated in the Dispensation, announced that his residence at Rising Sun being too remote and inconvenient a distance for frequent attendance, he would appoint the following to act as officers until his further order in the premises: Benjamin Taylor Kavanaugh, Grand Commander *pro tem;* William Sheets, Generalissimo; John H. Sanders, Captain-General; James S. Brown, Prelate; John Greer, Senior Warden;

Cunningham S. Ramsey, Junior Warden; Livingston Dunlap, Treasurer; James Whitcomb, Recorder; William Sullivan, Standard Bearer; Austin W. Morris, Sword Bearer; Thomas Donnellan, Warder; Isaac Roll, First Guard; John Evans, Second Guard; Abram W. Harrison, Third Guard, and Charles I. Harris, Sentinel.

The first regular meeting of the Encampment was held on Tuesday, June 7th, and at this meeting the foregoing officers appointed were officially announced and confirmed.

A resolution was adopted at this meeting expressing sincere thanks to Sir William H. Raper and Sir Samuel Reed, in recognition of their services, rendered in the organization of the Encampment, and as further evidence of appreciation the sum of forty dollars, previously paid by the Recorder to Sir Knight Raper, was approved and an additional ten dollars was ordered to be paid to him; sixty dollars was voted to Sir Samuel Reed.

The Encampment was now well established and ready for further activities and on June 16th steps were taken to secure a permanent place for use as an Asylum. Two rooms were secured in the Norwood Block, later known as the Claypool Block, on the site now occupied by the Roosevelt Building, at the northeast corner of Washington and Illinois streets, at an annual rental of fifty dollars. The rooms were renovated, walls whitewashed, paper window blinds, cuspidors, a dozen candlesticks, and a few pieces of furniture were purchased, and on Augsut 1, 1848, the first meeting in the new quarters was opened.

Sir Samuel Reed was present at this meeting and was "allowed thirty-five dollars for his time, expenses, services and instructions in and for his present visit to this Encampment." He was also allowed twenty-six dollars for "a black silk robe, a white robe and sash, furnished for the Prelate." He remained several days afterward, giving instructions to the officers and assisting in the work of conferring the Orders of Knighthood. Frequent meetings were held during the months of July, August, September and October for conferring the Orders of Knighthood. They were temporarily suspended, however, on October 25th, when by special invitation extended by the Grand Lodge of Indiana, nearly all the resident members of Raper joined with the Grand Lodge members in procession and participated in the ceremonies of laying

the corner stone of the first Grand Lodge Masonic Hall, which was dedicated May 27, 1851. It was located on the lot at the southeast corner of Washington and Tennessee (now Capitol Avenue) Streets. After this, the first public event in which Raper was somewhat conspicuous, ceremonial work was resumed and meetings were held weekly until Dec. 13th, when the year closed, with twenty-four additional enrollments, the total membership Dec. 31, 1848, being fifty-five.

The record shows that the officers appointed by Sir Abel C. Pepper, as designated in his Dispensation as Grand Commander, continued to serve with the exception that at the first meeting, held Jan. 1, 1849, Sir John H. Sanders, Captain-General, and Sir James Whitcomb, Recorder, resigned and Sir Henry F. West was appointed Captain-General and Sir Francis King became the Recorder.

Sir Abel C. Pepper, who had presided over the Encampment as the Grand Commander but once and then only temporarily, resigned as Grand Commander on May 24th, and with Sirs James H. Pepper, James Sterratt, David G. Rabb and Alexander C. Downey were granted dimits for the purpose of joining with other Sir Knights and applying for a Dispensation to organize an Encampment at Rising Sun, but no further definite action was ever taken. Sir Benjamin Taylor Kavanaugh was at once elected Grand Commander for the remaining months of the year.

On May 31st the Encampment again united with the Officers and Representatives of the Grand Lodge of Indiana in a public procession with proper formation and paraded over the principle streets of the city and then to the Second Presbyterian Church situated at that time on the northwest corner of the Circle and Market Streets, where after an interesting program of exercises and an oration by Grand Master Elizur Dening, the Sir Knights returned to the Asylum, where it was "resolved that we as Sir Knights of Raper Encampment hold in high esteem the distinguished services of our Most Worshipful Grand Master, and deem it but a just tribute to his high Masonic and moral worth to tender to him the Orders of Knighthood." The proper fee was remitted, and the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross was conferred upon him on June 26th, and on the following May 27th, 1850, he was created a Sir Knight.

Since the date of its organization, the dignity, high standing and deportment of all members who had become identified with the Encampment, was such as to commend it to the most favorable consideration of all elements of society in the then small city of about six thousand inhabitants, and while the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquors was not restricted by very stringent laws, still there seemed to have been a strong temperance sentiment in the community. The intense anti-liquor movement was promoted by the Neal-Dow agitation in New York and throughout the middle west. The peace, harmony and brotherly love, prevailing at the time, was greatly disturbed by one indiscreet member whose action prompted the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted on Dec. 26th, 1849:

"WHEREAS, the practice of using intoxicating liquor in such quantity or degree as to debase the noble faculties of our nature upon the cultivation of which depends our success in developing the Christian and Masonic virtues, which go to make up the character of the upright Mason, has ever been condemned by our ancient and honorable Order; and

"WHEREAS, Temperance has stood forth as one of the cardinal virtues of Masonry from time immemorial; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That it is an unwarrantable departure from the groundwork and first principles of our ancient and honorable Order to tolerate or allow of the reception or retention of a member of this Encampment who either uses intoxicating liquors as a beverage intemperately, or engages in the traffic of the same, except for mechanical, chemical, medicinal or sacramental purposes; and that it is a gross violation of the spirit and letter of these Christian Orders to tolerate or allow in any of its members the practice of gambling, swearing, or immoralities of this class, and that this Encampment will in no case hold Knightly fellowship with persons known to be guilty of such practices; also a liar, a thief, or the oppressors of the widow and the orphan."

The offending member was suspended, and later expelled for the second offense. The year 1849 closed with fifty-seven names on the roster.

Facsimile of Charter Granted To Raper Commandery No. 1 By General Grand Encampment, K. T., U. S. A. October 16, 1850.

The Charter and Early History

The year 1850 started with Benjamin T. Kavanaugh as Grand Commander. Besides the routine of conferring the Orders of Knighthood as occasion required, the year was uneventful until Nov. 7th, when a special meeting was held in compliance with an order of Sir Abel C. Pepper, the official representative of the Most Eminent Sir William B. Hubbard, Grand Master of the General Grand Encampment, authorizing him to institute the Encamp-Sir Knight Pepper was announced and received in form. ment. and proceeded to install the officers-elect, deliver the charter. authorized by the General Grand Encampment, dated Oct. 16, 1850, and thus duly constituted and dedicated Raper Encampment No. 1 Knights Templar of Indianapolis. After felicitations Sir Wm. Sheets offered a resolution which was adopted, "that a vote of thanks from this Encampment be tendered to Sir Abel C. Pepper for his attendance and for the courtesies and dignified manner in which his duties in the dedication of this Encampment have been performed."

The first officers therefore regularly elected and installed in Raper Encampment were: Benjamin Taylor Kavanaugh, Grand Commander; William Sheets, Generalissimo; James S. Brown, Captain-General; William Sullivan, Prelate; Livingston Dunlap, Treasurer; Francis King, Recorder; William W. Wick, Senior Warden; Ephriam Colestock, Junior Warden; William H. Lingenfelter, Standard Bearer; Samuel Delzelle, Sword Bearer; William H. Karnes, Warder, and Charles I. Hand, Sentinel.

These officers, who served until their successors were elected, were publicly installed in the Grand Lodge Masonic Hall on the evening of January 25, 1851, before a large number of Masons and their ladies, by Sir Benjamin T. Kavanaugh.

The first death occuring among the membership of the Encampment was that of Sir William Quarles, an attorney of prominence in Indianapolis. He was the tenth member to receive the Orders of Knighthood, which were conferred upon him May 26, 1848. He was a member of Centre Lodge No. 23 of Indianapolis, and his death occurred on Dec. 20, 1849. Suitable resolutions expressing the sentiments of regret and condolence over his demise were adopted Dec. 29th, by the members assembled on that date.

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The first funeral ceremony in which the Encampment participated was that occasioned by the death of Thomas Donnellan, a member of Centre Lodge No. 23. He was the seventeenth member to receive the Orders of Knighthood, on May 24, 1848, and his death occurred May 2, 1851. He was buried on Sunday, May 4th, Sirs James Whitcomb, John S. Bobbs, William Sullivan and Alois D. Gall serving as pall-bearers.

On May 27, 1851, the Grand Lodge Masonic Hall having been completed, by invitation the Commandery united with the officers and many representatives of the Grand Lodge of Indiana and formed in procession and paraded through a part of Washington and other principal streets, proceeding to the Hall where they attended the ceremonies of dedication.

The old quarters in the Norwood Block were not suitable or satisfactory for the uses of Raper Encampment and arrangements were made for removal into the Grand Lodge Masonic Hall, at an annual rental of fifty dollars, which included the cost of providing special rearrangements and some additional facilities which were The change was made on June 1, 1851, when deemed necessary. the first meeting was held in the new Asylum. The Encampment remained there until 1875, when a temporary change was made to the Aetna Block in North Pennsylvania Street. After the completion and remodeling of the Masonic Temple the Encampment again returned to the improved quarters in the Temple, where it remained until May 9, 1906, when because of the destruction of the Temple by fire, another change was made to No. 41 West Pearl Street. Upon the completion of the present Masonic Temple, the Asylum was elaborately furnished and equipped and is now called "our house."

On May 26, 1849, a resolution was adopted approving a proposed petition of several Sir Knights for a dispensation to form an Encampment to be located at Rising Sun, which was the home of Sirs Abel C. Pepper, James H .Pepper, James Sterratt, David G. Rabb, and Alexander C. Downey. They were granted dimits on May 24th with that purpose in view. Others were to join with them in the proposed petition, but apparently no further effort was put forth to establish this Encampment.

Raper Encampment, until the organization of the Grand Encampment of Indiana, had sole jurisdiction in the State of Indi-

ana, and its approval and written recommendation was necessary before Dispensations to form additional Encampments would be given by the General Grand Encampment or the General Grand Master. From time to time such requests were made for Raper's approval, which were all cheerfully granted.

On January 18, 1851, Sirs Jacob E. Houser, William F. Pidgeon and Homer T. Inman, designated for the three principal officers and seven others not named, who were residents of Greensburg, requested a favorable recommendation by Raper Encampment which was given, although this materially reduced her membership. Later Baldwin Encampment No. 2 was duly and regularly constituted at Greensburg and later removed to Shelbyville.

On March 24, 1852, a similar petition which was presented by Sirs Henry C. Lawrence, Elizur Deming and Abram Fry, residents of LaFayette, was approved, which still further reduced the names on Raper's roster.

Fort Wayne was the next to receive favorable consideration by Raper Encampment, although the first request in 1851 was opposed. Two Encampments in Ohio objected because of irregularities in the petition to the Grand Master, and later to the choice of the Sir Knight recommended for the first Grand Commander. Finally, in 1854, the objections were withdrawn, and the Encampment was constituted as Fort Wayne Encampment No. 4.

The General Grand Encampment of the United States at its triennial meeting at Hartford, Connecticut, in September, 1856, amended its constitution, whereby it adopted the title of "Grand Encampment," with the name of "Grand Commandery" for state bodies instead of "Grand Encampment," and "Commandery" instead of "Encampment" for subordinate bodies.

Sir James S. Brown was re-elected Grand Commander for 1852 and served until Nov. 13th, when he resigned, received a dimit and removed from the State. Sir John S. Bobbs succeeded him and served the remainder of the year, and no change occurred in the other officers during the year, which ended with the enrollment slightly increased. Sir John S. Bobbs was re-elected Grand Commander and served as such for the year 1853.

At the meeting on September 10, 1853, initial steps were taken looking to the organization of a Grand Encampment for Indiana.

and again on March 29, 1854, when a petition was forwarded to the General Grand Master, requesting him to issue a call for a convention for that purpose of representatives to be elected by all Encampments then existing in Indiana.

Sir Alois D. Gall was the first representative of Raper Encampment to the General Grand Encampment which at that time exercised direct supervision over all independent Encampments, and to which annual reports were made. He was Generalissimo at the time and the only Sir Knight from Indiana present at the twelfth Triennial Conclave held at Lexington, Kentucky, September 13, 1853. He was of German parentage and received his education in German schools and colleges, thereafter engaging in the practice of medicine and surgery. He located in Indianapolis in 1847, and became active in public affairs of the city. He was appointed United States Consul at Antwerp, Belgium. by President Franklin Pierce and held that office through the administration of President James Buchanan. He dimitted from Raper Encampment Nov. 11, 1853, after making verbal report as the representative to the General Grand Encampment. Being about to depart for his post of duty in a foreign land for some time, as a token of his regard for Raper Encampment he presented to the Grand Commander for his official use, a splendid jewel to be worn by that officer. In the course of a very appropriate address, which was responded to in a very fitting manner, Sir John S. Bobbs, the presiding officer duly accepted the gift. In return, by action of the Encampment, Rev. T. H. Lynch was directed to purchase a pocket Bible and the Grand Commander to purchase a handsome walking stick to be presented to Sir Alois D. Gall as a token of the high esteem and regard in which he was held as a member of the Order. Resolutions of thanks for the jewel were ordered engrossed, and with the Bible and cane, were presented to him at the meeting held on Nov. 18th, which was made an occasion of more than usual interest to the Sir Knights of the city. After returning to Indianapolis from Antwerp he renewed his membership in the Encampment, which continued until the time of his death, Feb. 11, 1867. This year six additional Sir Knights were enrolled upon the roster of members.

Sir William Sheets was the Grand Commander for the year 1854. Only two meetings were held and but one petition for the

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Orders of Knighthood was presented during his term.

The request, made in 1853, that a Grand Encampment of Indiana be formed received favorable consideration by the General Grand Master, who directed that a convention be held in Indianapolis, May 16, 1854, in the Grand Lodge Masonic Hall, where the organization was perfected under warrant of the General Grand Encampment. The next conclave of the Grand Encampment of Indiana was held at LaFayette on Wednesday, Dec. 27, 1854, with Sir Henry C. Lawrence of LaFayette Encampment No. 3 as Grand Commander and Sir Francis King of Raper Encampment No. 1 as Grand Recorder. The five Encampments represented at this conclave were Raper No. 1, Baldwin No. 2, LaFayette No. 3, Fort Wayne No. 4 and New Albany U. D., which was chartered as No. 5. No other matter of public interest received consideration during this year.

The year 1855 opened with Sir John S. Bobbs again as Grand Commander. Stated meetings were held for the transaction of business with greater regularity, and four petitioners received the Orders of Knighthood. The Grand Encampment of Indiana, having been clothed with authority to exercise its prerogatives, was perhaps one cause for the seemingly semi-dormant condition; but it should be remembered that the curtailment of jurisdiction and the organization of additional Encampments also tended to the lessening of Raper's opportunities. Thereafter the Grand Encampment of Indiana required annual reports to be made. Ephriam Colestock entered upon the discharge of his duties as Grand Commander on January 23, 1856, upon which date he was duly elected and installed.

Nomenclature and Costumes

The reader will observe that hitherto in this book the term "Encampment" has been used in designating the different Templar Organizations. On September 15, 1856, at the Triennial Conclave of the General Grand Encampment which was held at Hartford, Connecticut, among other amendments to the Constitution, was one eliminating the term "Encampment" wherever it applied to Grand or Subordinate bodies and substituting the term "Commandery." It seems this amendment was not promulgated until the publication of the Constitution in 1859. The first evidence

that Raper had knowledge of this change appears in the record under date of March 6, 1860, and the former term continued to be used until that time. In this work, hereafter the name "Raper Commandery" will be the designation.

Other changes, in the nomenclature of the Order, were also authorized: the General Grand Master of the Grand Encampment was addressed as "Grand Master" with the honorary title "Most Eminent Grand Master," the Deputy Grand Master as "Right Eminent," the Grand Commander of Indiana was to be known also as "Right Eminent" Grand Commander, and the remaining officers of the Grand Commandery were designated as "Eminent;" and the Subordinate Commanderies presiding officer also became "Eminent" as his honorary title.

While mentioning these changes, it is considered timely to refer to the matter of a costume or dress for a Sir Knight, which had not at this time so far as known been considered of much importance by the members of Raper Commandery. It appears that Commanderies in other States were equally indifferent in that re-A few members felt that some kind of a costume should lation. be worn, especially on public occasions, which perhaps emanated from reports made by Sir Knights who had observed uniformed Templars present at Conclaves of the Grand Encampment. Hearing various suggestions and recommendations of the Most Eminent Grand Master made at such Conclaves, especially that of 1856, in which he said "all of our traditions show unmistakably that the dress of Ancient Templars was uniform and it was the custom of our predecessors, in these Encampments prior to the formation of the General Grand Encampment, when assembled in Conclaves or otherwise, to be dressed in appropriate costume and wearing the jewel of office. I am not aware of any Constitutional statute or rule having been adopted establishing a uniform dress for the members at large, or any distinctive jewel of office. I believe there is a necessity for a correct and permanent rule on this subject, as many are anxiously desirous of having this matter settled—that is, to have an appropriate dress designated." This was the initial movement looking to the adoption of a uniform equipment. Action was deferred in defining by specification and in the adoption of a uniform, until 1859, when one was proposed as follows:

"The costume of a Knight Templar shall consist of a full suit of black cloth, coat and pantaloons; white cravat, black gloves, boots, spurs, and over all a white sur-coat with red cross embroidered on the left breast; undress military cap with Templar cross on the front; cross hilted sword, with scabbard of black leather suspended from a black leather baldric, a short dagger on the left side; a black velvet triangular shaped apron with white metal trimmings and emblematic figures thereon; Templar badge suspended from a red ribbon to be worn around the neck. A gold ring may be worn on the index finger of the right hand, the inside bearing the name of the wearer and the date of his creation as a Templar."

Again the matter was postponed until 1862, when changes were made by substituting a cloak for the sur-coat, a chapeau with white plume for the cap, leather gauntlets for black gloves, and a red belt for the baldric or sword holder, and the amended specifications for a correct uniform were adopted. An edict was soon after issued by the Most Eminent Grand Master, directing all Grand Commanderies to enforce its use in all subordinate Commanderies.

The uniform adopted had, in part at least, been in use by Commanderies in Ohio and two New England States. The portrait of Sir William H. Raper which now hangs in the Asylum of Raper Commandery, shows him adorned with the uniform as then used by Reed Encampment No. 6 of Dayton, for indoor pur-The uniform as described did not prove to be popular and poses. in 1862, what is practically the same as that now in use, was adopted, and the Grand Commander of Indiana directed its use by all Commanders within his jurisdiction. About 1902 gauntlets and red leather belts became obsolete and buff colored lisle or silk gloves with black belts and hangers trimmed with silver braid, have since been worn by the Sir Knights of Raper Com-A glance through the tabular statement of members mandery. further along will show the year 1856 closed with only fortythree members, representing a loss of twelve during the year.

Ephriam Colestock was re-elected Eminent Commander annually until Dec. 31, 1868. All other officers, serving in 1856 except the Generalissimo and Warden, were re-elected in 1857. The year closed with forty-five members, being a gain of two. In

1858 there was a decrease in members to forty-three, in 1859 an increase to forty-nine, and in 1860 an increase to sixty. During these years the Commandery continued its routine work in a manner which calls for no special mention, notwithstanding the political conditions prevailing throughout the State and Nation during these four years, which demoralized almost all public affairs and caused more or less strained relations between associations, growing out of the question of Slavery. Although the membership of Raper Commandery was limited in numbers, the members did not overlook nor disregard the opportunities presented occasionally to accept invitations to participate in or give social entertainments to their families and friends. There is evidence in the old records that these events were enjoyable and served temporarily to cause exciting differences to be forgotten.

Then in 1861, came the eventful days of the Civil War which will ever be memorable in our history as a Nation. This engrossed the attention of the membership almost exclusively. Only four Conclaves were held in January, February, March and December. Christopher H. Brown was the only Sir Knight created as such during the year, on March 21st. The membership again was reduced to forty-five, representing a loss of fourteen.

A number of the members whose names are still familiar to many who may read this work are known to have given valiant service as soldiers and in other lines of duty to the State and Nation.

From Jan. 1, 1862, to Dec. 31, 1868, five members were added to the roster by affiliation and fifty-seven by initiation, but the total number of members at the end of that period was only sixty, as shown by the report on the files of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, which would indicate a net increase of fifteen during the seven years. Roger Parry succeeded Ephriam Colestock as Eminent Commander and served as such in 1869, 1870, 1871.

Finances and Charities

The financial condition of the Commandery during all these years was not very prosperous. Frequent voluntary contributions to the treasury by nearly all the members only helped temporarily. Seldom was there a balance in the treasury at the close of the year, after all current expenses had been paid. To over-

come the trouble the fees and dues were greatly increased, special assessments were levied, but with poor results. There seems to have been a constant necessity for dispensing charity to worthy members, and institutions depending upon the public for assistance. There is nothing on record indicating that Raper Commandery ever refused to contribute to a worthy cause "to clothe the naked, feed the hungry and bind up the wounds of the afflicted;" and there were great opportunities for observing this injunction during and following the War period. Just one instance: A sojourning Knight was given fifty dollars for relief during a serious illness, but this not being sufficient for his needs, members present at the time contributed an additional hundred dollars, and the Commandery then appropriated every dollar it had in the treasury to relieve the suffering frater. Other similar magnanimous responses were of frequent occurrence, thus showing the true spirit of real charity With the hope that the Commandery Treasury would be benefitted thereby, a "Grand Masonic Festival" was held in June, 1870, the net proceeds adding one hundred and seventy-three dollars to the small balance of available funds.

The great fire of 1871 which nearly destroyed the city of Chicago also called for financial help from every possible source, and in addition to a small contribution by the Commandery, the members helped to raise several hundred dollars which was forwarded to the afflicted citizens, many of whom were Masons.

Nothing has been discovered on the records to indicate when the members of the Commandery equipped themselves with the Templar costume or regulation uniform. Circumstantial information gathered from other sources leads to the belief that it was some time in the year 1870, inasmuch as conditional preparations had been started for attending the Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment which was held in Baltimore, Md., in September, 1871. It is assumed that drill-practice had been executed, as thirty swords and belts had been purchased from the United States Arsenal Commandant, and three copies each of the Ohio and the Illinois Manual drill tactics for the Asylum, as well as for public use had been procured; also a contract had been awarded, "for lockers to hold uniforms, in the Asylum." A few of these lockers escaped destruction by fire when the Masonic

Temple was burned in 1906, and they were removed to 41 West Pearl Street, the temporary quarters occupied during the erection of the present Temple. It is further evident that uniforms had been procured, from the fact that an invitation was accepted to join Montgomery Lodge No. 16 of Crawfordsville, in celebrating St. John the Baptist's Day on June 24th and a "practice drill in full uniform" was called for the evening before the pilgrimage.

Fraternal and Social Courtesies

Almost the first action taken by the Commandery in 1881 was to direct that one hundred dollars be donated to the general emergency fund then necessary to relieve the distressing conditions confronting the people who were living in Indiana towns, villages and cities located along the Ohio River, which were caused by the floods and overflow of that stream in February. In addition voluntary contributions by the individual Sir Knights increased the fund nearly five hundred dollars.

No formal observance of Easter Sunday by the Commandery, previous to this year appears on record, but upon invitation from Sir Bishop David B. Knickerbacker in St. Paul's Episcopal Church of Indianapolis, seventy-five Sir Knights in full Templar uniform attended divine worship conducted by the Bishop acting as Prelate, on April 13th. Since that time many invitations have been extended to and accepted by the Commandery from churches of several denominations to participate in such services.

On June 24th of this year the Commandery made a pilgrimage to Louisville, Kentucky, and participated with the Louisville Commanderies, Louisville No. 1, and DeMolay No. 12, in the usual formal celebration of St. John's Day for the benefit of the Kentucky Masonic Widows' and Orphans' Home at Louisville.

In October of this year the Commandery presented Anderson Commandery U. D. a silver libation service, suitably engraved, as evidence of its esteem and well wishes. The recipients expressed their appreciation of the gift by unanimously adopting the following resolution:

"WHEREAS, Raper Commandery No. 1, whose well-earned fame has spread both far and wide for deeds of charity and pure benificence, has in a spirit of Knighthood seen fit to bestow upon Anderson Commandery, U. D., the gift of a Templar libation service; therefore,

"Resolved by Anderson Commandery, U. D., that we accept this gift in the same Knightly spirit which prompted its bestowal, feeling that mere words and forms of speech are too feeble and wholly inadequate to carry to the Sir Knights of Raper the true and deepfelt gratitude that fills the hearts of every Sir Knight of Anderson Commandery, for this gift; that we shall preserve and cherish this gift as the property of this Commandery, always bearing in Knightly remembrance the many kind words and acts said and done for us and in our behalf by Raper Commandery."

On Dec. 16 the officers and forty other Sir Knights of Raper Commandery visited Anderson Commandery, U. D., and assisted in conferring the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross on a large class of candidates. Ten members were added to the roster in 1884.

Sir Phineas Hunt served as Eminent Commander in 1885, during which year another pilgrimage by the Commandery was made to Muncie, Indiana, the occasion being the laying of the cornerstone of the Delaware County Court House, on July 23rd. Accompanied by Beizenherz's Band, forty Sir Knights participated in a very creditable parade and, with other Commanderies, escorted the distinguished members of the Masonic fraternity who had charge of the ceremonies. Seven additional members gave a total at the close of the year of one hundred and seventy-seven.

Christian Brink was Eminent Commander in 1886, and during this year Easter Services were again attended by seventy-five Sir Knights on April 25, 1886, at St. Paul's Church, upon the invitation of the Rector, Sir Knight Joseph S. Jenckes.

The Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment was held in St. Louis, Missouri, on September 21st to 24th of this year. As the attendance of the Commandery was contingent upon funds necessary to defray the expense, and as there were no available funds in the treasury, therefore a series of entertainments was promoted by a few of the former members of the old Drill Corps of 1883, by which \$564 was raised and a full team made the pilgrimage. This team contributed largely toward the entertainment for the members of the Grand Commandery of Indiana at the Lindell Hotel Headquarters, and with the Terre Haute and LaFayette Commanderies, acted as escort for the Grand Commandery in the parade. There were no competitive drills

on the occasion, but Raper and other visiting Commanderies gave exhibition drills to which a small admission fee was charged, the proceeds going to a proposed Masonic Home for Widows and Orphans for the State of Missouri. The San Francisco Trophy was loaned to the St. Louis fraters for exhibition purposes, and this is said to have added materially to the Home funds. After returning the team had a balance of \$84.80, which it placed in the treasury of the Commandery.

Up to this time the Commandery had not been lavish, nor did the by-laws authorize the complimentary bestowal of honorary membership upon any one, but on Nov. 9, 1886, the by-laws were amended permitting this to be done. On Dec. 16 Past Grand Commander William H. Hacker, of Baldwin Commandery No. 2 of Shelbyville, and Past Grand Commander Albert P. Charles, were elected, and Sir John S. Simon, who had been created a Sir Knight in the Commandery Jan. 18, 1849, was also declared to be an honorary member by ratifying his election, which occurred Oct. 22, 1878, without proper authority. Since these notable Knights were made honorary members the following fraters, all of whom have attained eminence and performed many deeds of Knightly service of distinction in York Rite Masonry, have been added to our roll of honorary members, as follows: Sirs Calvin W. Prather, John J. Glendening, Robert A. Woods, Adrian Hamersly, Leonidas P. Newby, George S. Parker, John L. Rupe, William W. Horner, Elwood Barnard, Harry G. Strickland, John W. McAdams and William H. Swintz.

Sir John T. Brush served as Eminent Commander in 1887.

Sir William Beach, who had served nearly seventeen consecutive years as Sentinel of the Commandery, died on August 18, 1887. For several months he had been unable to perform his official duties, but the Commandery continued his compensation until the time of his death, when he was given a Templar burial.

The Grand Commandery of Indiana held its Annual Conclave in Indianapolis again, on April 26, and was entertained by Raper, extending many courtesies suitable for such meetings, and in the evening exemplifying the Order of the Temple in the Asylum which, because of recent revisions and additional features, had caused an unusual interest to be manifested by Sir Knights from many Commanderies throughout the State.

The Grand Commandery expressed the wish that all Indiana Commanderies attend the Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment to be held in Washington, D. C., in 1889. Preliminary steps were taken in August of this year by Raper to do so and committees on ways and means and transportation were appointed, and also guaranteed three dollars per capita toward the expenses of entertainment by the Grand Commandery on the condition that all other Commanderies would be equally as generous. Four members were added this year.

Sir Jacob W. Smith was Eminent Commander in 1888, during which year nothing transpired worthy of notice, other than to enroll two petitioners for membership by affiliation, grant dimits to ten Sir Knights and record the death of Cortez F. Holliday, which occurred on March 5th, and the appointment of Sir Wm. H. Smythe as Recorder of the Grand Commandery.

In the year 1889 Byron K. Elliott was Eminent Commander, and Sir Knight Jacob W. Smith was Recorder, he having been elected to that office at the annual stated conclave in December, 1888. The Commandery attended the Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment at Washington, D. C., in October of this year, but no record of the number attending appears. Nothing of interest except the routine work of the Commandery during the year, the conferring of the Orders on eleven candidates and electing four Sir Knights to membership on dimits from other Commanderies, appear on the records.

In the years 1890 and 1891 William J. McKee was Eminent Commander.

At the stated conclave of December 8th, 1891, two hundred dollars was appropriated for expenses of the headquarters of the Indiana Grand Commandery at the coming Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment at Denver, Colorado.

In the year 1892 John William Staub was Eminent Commander.

The Commandery attended the Twenty-fifth Triennial Conclave in Denver, Colorado, but no record of the number attending appears on the record.

In the years 1893 and 1894 Vestal W. Woodward was Eminent Commander.

On February 16th the Commandery acted as escort to Mystic Tie Lodge No. 398, F. & A. M., and the Scottish Rite at the funeral

at Orleans, Indiana, of Sir Knight Bruce Carr, a member of Raper Commandery and Past Grand Master of the Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of Indiana, who died in Indianapolis on February 14th.

On April 18th, 1894, Raper Commandery conferred the Order of the Temple during the Fortieth Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery, where sixty-eight visitors from twenty-four Commanderies were present.

At the stated conclave held November 13th, 1894, the use of the Asylum and adjacent rooms was tendered to the Scottish Rite bodies for their convocation on December 11th, 12th and 13th and subsequent meetings, in consequence of the destruction of the Scottish Rite Temple by fire on November 3rd.

In the years 1895 and 1896 Ahira R. White was Eminent Commander.

At the stated conclave on April 17th, 1895, the Commandery conferred the Order of the Temple with sixty-five representatives of the Grand Commandery, representing twenty-five Commanderies, present.

On June 24th, 1895, the Commandery participated in the cornerstone-laying ceremonies of the Scottish Rite Temple on South Pennsylvania street.

In August of this year the Commandery made a pilgrimage to Boston to attend the Twenty-sixth Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment. Arriving in Boston on August 26th in three Pullman cars, the Commandery took part in the grand parade on the 27th and in other events incident to the Conclave until its close on August 29th.

At the stated conclave of August 8th a request from the officers of Murat Temple, A. A. O. N. M. S., for the use of the Asylum on November 29th, for the purpose of conferring the Orders of the Shrine, was granted.

At the annual stated conclave of December 10th, 1895, Sir Knight Vestal W. Woodward was elected and installed Prelate of the Commandery for the ensuing year.

In the year 1897 William S. Rich was Eminent Commander.

At the stated conclaves of May 11th and November 9th of this year, resolutions were adopted that the Commandery arrange for the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of its organization

on May 14th, 1898, and for the appointment of the necessary committees for the event.

The year's activities in conferring the Orders consisted of conferring the Order of the Red Cross on six candidates and the Orders of Knights of Malta and the Temple on two candidates, and two were elected to membership.

In the year 1898 Charles L. Hutchinson was Eminent Commander.

At the stated conclave of January 11th of this year the following report of the committee on the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the organization was adopted:

"The committee recommends that the fiftieth anniversary of Raper Commandery, the institution of Templar Masonry in Indiana, be celebrated on the 14th day of May, 1898. The exercises to consist of reception and escort of Commanderies in the morning, lunch at noon, parade, and review by the Grand Commander in the afternoon, and banquet in the evening in the dining room of the Scottish Rite Temple House.

"It is recommended that all the Commanderies in Indiana be invited to attend in uniform.

"The committee estimates the expenses for carrying out the program at not less than one thousand dollars (\$1,000.00), the amount to be raised by subscription among the members of Raper Commandery."

The Eminent Commander then announced the following committees:

Committee on Arrangements—Charles L. Hutchinson, William Schoppenhorst, Jacob W. Smith, Nicholas R. Ruckle, George A. Gay, Henry C. Adams, Austin H. Brown.

Committee on Finance-Henry C. Adams, Frank W. Lewis, Julius C. Walk, Albert Gall, Horace E. Kinney, Wilbur F. Browder, Roscoe O. Hawkins.

Committee on Souvenirs—Joseph W. Smith, William Schoppenhorst, Henri T. Conde.

The subject of drill meetings being under discussion, on motion it was ordered that the Commandery inaugurate a series of drill meetings, the initial drill meeting to take place on the first Friday evening after the next stated conclave, and that the Eminent Commander and Recorder prepare a circular to be mailed to members, urging attendance at drills.

At the stated conclave of April 26th a motion prevailed that the date of the Fiftieth Anniversary Celebration be changed from Saturday, May 14th, to Friday, May 13th, and that the proper notices be mailed announcing the change of date.

At the stated conclave of May 10th the Eminent Commander made a verbal report of the arrangements that had been made for celebrating the Fiftieth Anniversary of Raper Commandery on Friday, the 13th, stating that all details had been provided for carrying out the program as arranged by the Committee on Arrangements. All that would be necessary would be good weather, and the co-operation of the Sir Knights on that day, to make the occasion a success and an eventful one in the history of the Order in this jurisdiction.

After some preliminary remarks by various members, it was by motion ordered that the Trophy of the Commandery (the Mounted Knight) be removed from the Asylum to the Scottish Rite Temple House and placed on exhibition for this occasion.

At 1:30 P. M. on Friday, May 13th, the Commandery assembled in the Asylum for the purpose of appearing in public in full Templar uniform and taking part in the street parade and review which had been arranged as part of the program for celebrating the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Commandery and the advent of Templar Masonry in this grand jurisdiction.

The following dispensation was received authorizing the Commandery to appear in public:

GRAND COMMANDERY, KNIGHTS TEMPLAR OF INDIANA Office of R. E. Grand Commander

Eminent Sir and Frater:

Permission is hereby granted to Raper Commandery No. 1 to

appear in public as a Commandery, May 13th, 1898, on account of the Fiftieth Anniversary of Templar Masonry in Indiana.

During the forenoon of this day, detachments of Raper Commandery were kept busy receiving and escorting visiting Commanderies from the Union Station to the Masonic Temple, where headquarters had been established. Lunch and light refreshments were served in the Grand Lodge Hall to the visiting Sir Knights and members of the various bands of music accompanying them from 10:00 o'clock A. M. until 1:00 o'clock P. M.

Promptly at 2:00 o'clock the Sir Knights of Raper Commandery formed lines under the direction of R. E. Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle, Captain General of the Commandery, at the corner of Washington street and Capitol avenue, where the parade formed on the east side of Capitol avenue, the right of the column resting on Washington street and extending south in the following order:

Raper Commandery No. 1, of Indianapolis, with sixty swords; Baldwin Commandery No. 2, of Shelbyville, with thirty swords; Lafayette Commandery No. 3, of Lafayette, with fifty swords; Knightstown Commandery No. 9, of Knightstown, with forty swords; Terre Haute Commandery No. 16, of Terre Haute, with fifty-seven swords; Muncie Commandery No. 18, of Muncie, with forty swords; Franklin Commandery No. 23, of Franklin, with twenty swords; Frankfort Commandery No. 29, of Franklin, with twenty swords; Greenfield Commandery No. 36, of Kokomo, with twelve swords; Greenfield Commandery No. 39, of Greenfield, with thirty-six swords.

Individual Sir Knights from various Commanderies in the state were in attendance to the number of about one hundred, and they were distributed among the Commanderies in line for the parade. Officers and members of the Grand Commandery to the number of twenty-five were assigned an appropriate position in carriages in the column, making in all fully five hundred Sir Knights in line, besides the various bands of music accompanying the Commanderies.

Promptly at 2:30 o'clock, when Right Eminent Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle, who had been designated as Chief Marshal, gave the

command "Forward," his attention was directed to the column about to move, and at the same instant the horse he was riding became frightened at the music and in this unguarded moment threw his rider to the ground. Fortunately, Sir Ruckle was not seriously hurt, and after a few moments assumed the command on foot. The line of march was as follows: East on Washington street to Pennsylvania, north on Pennsylvania to Vermont, west on Vermont to Meridian, south on Meridian to Monument Place, around the east and south sides of Monument Place (where the parade was reviewed by the Grand Commander, Right Eminent Sir John H. Nicholson, and staff, and officers and members of the Grand Commandery, in carriages), thence west on Market street to Illinois, south on Illinois to Maryland, west on Maryland to Capitol avenue, north on Capitol avenue to Masonic Temple, where the parade was dismissed.

The handsome uniforms and gay equipment of the Sir Knights, together with the soul-stirring and patriotic music of the many bands, created great enthusiasm among the spectators who thronged the streets, and it was universally acknowledged to be the handsomest and most imposing procession that had appeared in the streets of Indianapolis for many years.

After resting for a few moments the Sir Knights resumed their fatigue dress. They were escorted to the Union Railway Station, where a special train, which was furnished complimentary for the occasion by the Monon Railway Company, was in waiting, and all were taken to Camp Mount to visit the Indiana soldiers who were encamped there, to the number of about five thousand, awaiting orders from the War Department to take part in the war with Spain for the liberation of Cuba.

After about a two-hours visit at the camp, and the witnessing of the dress parade by the troops, the Sir Knights returned to the city and procedeed to the Scottish Rite Temple House, where all enjoyed a social hour in the spacious and elegant parlors of our worthy and hospitable allies, the Scottish Rite brethren of the Valley of Indianapolis.

At 7:30 o'clock the Sir Knights were invited to the banqueting hall on the second floor of the Temple House, where about five hundred were seated at tables. Sir Charles L. Hutchinson, Eminent Commander of Raper Commandery, presided as toastmaster

and Sir Vestal W. Woodward, Prelate, invoked the Divine blessing. Right Eminent Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle delivered the address of welcome. Right Eminent Sir Henry C. Adams read a well prepared history of Raper Commandery in which was recited many interesting events which had taken place since its advent fifty years ago, and the prominent place it had attained among the Commanderies of the United States. Sentiments were responded to as follows:

"The Grand Commandery of Indiana."

Response by R. E. Sir John H. Nicholson, Grand Commander. "Our Country."

Response by Sir Knight William Dudley Foulke, of Richmond. Some very pleasing vocal selections were rendered during the evening by the Scottish Rite Glee Club.

At a late hour the festivities came to a close, and the ceremonies of celebrating the Fiftieth Anniversary of Raper Commandery were ended.

At the stated conclave in June, the Recorder reported the amount received by subscription of the members for the expenses of the fiftieth Anniversary Celebration was \$842.00 and the amount expended was \$749.10, leaving a balance of \$92.90, which amount was on motion ordered paid into the general fund of the Commandery.

The following resolutions were presented and adopted at this conclave:

Whereas, In arranging for the celebration of Raper Commandery's Fiftieth Anniversary, a committee called on the officials of the Monon Railway for the purpose of procuring transportation of visiting Sir Knights to Camp Mount and return, and Whereas, Said officials did, of their own volition, tender to the committee the use of a special train for the purpose, with the compliments of the Monon Railway Co., and Whereas, Said Monon Railway Co., in order to furnish the train at the desired time, procured six passenger coaches from the C. C. C. & St. L. Ry., and which were loaned for the occasion without charge to any one, therefore be it Resolved, By the members of Raper Commandery No. 1, K. T., that we appreciate the kindness and courtesy extended to us by both railway companies, and in acknowledgment of the same we return to them our most grateful, sincere

and heartfelt thanks, and be it further Resolved, That these resolutions be spread upon the record of Raper Commandery and a copy be furnished to Mr. A. J. O'Reilly, General Agent of the Monon Railway, and one to Mr. J. A. Van Winkle, General Superintendent of the C. C. C. & St. L. Railway.

In 1899^{*} and 1900 William Schoppenhorst was Eminent Commander.

On Wednesday, April 19th, 1899, at 7:30 o'clock A. M., the Commandery assembled in the Asylum for the purpose of making the pilgrimage to Richmond, Indiana, to attend the fortyfifth Annual Conclave of the Knights Templar of Indiana.

The Commandery formed lines under the command of Sir Knight Nicholas R. Ruckle, Captain General, and marched through the streets of the city, preceeded by the When Military Band, arriving at the Union Station at 8:00 o'clock and the train carrying the Sir Knights arrived in Richmond at 10:00 o'clock.

The Commandery then formed lines and marched through the streets of the city of Richmond to the headquarters, where the Commandery was dismissed until 1:00 o'clock P. M., at which hour the Sir Knights again formed lines under the command of Sir Knight William S. Rich, acting as Captain General. The Sir Knights took part in the parade and escorted the Grand Commandery to the Masonic Temple, where the parade was dismissed and the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Indiana was opened for business.

The members of Raper Commandery returned home that evening, leaving the city of Richmond at 11:00 o'clock, with the exception of the delegates to the Grand Commandery, who remained to attend the conclave of that Grand Body.

On Wednesday, April 18th, 1900, the Commandery assembled in the Asylum at 12:30 o'clock for the purpose of taking part in the parade and acting as escort to the Grand Commandery on the occasion of the Forty-sixth Annual Conclave of the Knights Templar of Indiana. Lines were formed under command of Sir

Henri T. Conde, acting as Captain General, who marched to the right of the column to the corner of Maryland street and Capitol avenue.

Sir Knight William J. McKee acted as Chief Marshal of the parade.

Visiting Commanderies then formed in line in the order of their seniority of rank as follows:

Baldwin Commandery No. 2, of Shelbyville, twenty-five swords; Lafayette Commandery No. 3, of Lafayette, thirty swords; Richmond Commandery No. 8, of Richmond, thirty swords; Knightstown Commandery No. 9, of Knightstown, thirty swords; La Valette Commandery No. 15, of Evansville, thirty swords; Muncie Commandery No. 18, of Muncie, forty swords and band; Marion Commandery No. 21, of Marion, twenty swords; Franklin Commandery No. 23, of Franklin, twenty swords; St. John Commandery No. 24, of Logansport, twenty-five swords; Crawfordsville Commandery No. 25, of Crawfordsville, thirty swords; Frankfort Commandery No. 29, of Frankfort, thirty swords and band; Anderson Commandery No. 32, of Anderson, forty swords and band; Kokomo Commandery No. 36, of Kokomo, twenty-five swords; Greenfield Commandery No. 39, of Greenfield, thirty swords and band; Delphi Commandery No. 40, of Delphi, twenty swords; Lebanon Commandery No. 43, of Lebanon, twenty swords; New Castle Commandery, U. D., of New Castle, forty swords.

The column moved at 1:15, with the following line of march: East on Maryland street past the Grand Hotel, where the Grand Commandery was received and escorted to Meridian street; north to Washington, east on the south side of Washington to Alabama, where the column counter-marched; west on the north side of Washington to Pennsylvania street, north to New York street, west to Meridian, south on Meridian around the west side of Monument Place to Washington street, thence west to Capitol avenue, where the parade was dismissed.

The Grand Commandery being assembled in the audience room of the Masonic Temple, Raper Commandery performed the ceremonies of opening the Grand Commandery in full form, with Sir Knight William J. McKee acting as Captain General, after which the Commandery was dismissed.

In the evening at 8:00 o'clock Raper Commandery gave a social and entertainment to the Grand Commandery in the audience room of the Masonic Temple, where light refreshments were served, music was furnished and a number of attractions were presented on the stage, and later in the evening there was dancing.

On Monday, May 7th, the Commandery assembled in the Asylum at 12:45 o'clock, for the purpose of attending the funeral and acting as escort of Right Eminent Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle, Past Grand Commander of Knights Templar of Indiana and Captain General of Raper Commandery, who died on May 4th. The Commandery formed with fifty swords in line under command of acting Captain General Henri T. Conde.

The funeral services, which were commenced at St. Paul's Church and concluded at the cemetery, consisted of the beautiful and impressive burial service of the Episcopal Church, rendered in full by Rev. Sir Lewis Brown, assisted by Rev. Brother A. J. Graham, which was followed at the church by the Scottish Rite service, conducted by Ill. Brother Thomas E. Balding, 33°, Grand Master of Ceremonies of the Supreme Council. This was succeeded at the grave by the usual Masonic burial service which was rendered by the officers of the Grand Lodge of Indiana, The Most Worshipful Grand Master, William Geake, officiating. All the Masonic bodies of Indianapolis and all the Grand Masonic bodies of the State of Indiana were represented on this occasion.

At the stated conclave of June 12th Sir William J. McKee was elected Captain General of the Commandery to fill the vacancy in that office occasioned by the death of Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle.

In the year 1901 George A. Gay was Eminent Commander.

On March 12th resignation of Sir Knight William H. Smythe as Treasurer was offered on account of continued illness and accepted and on April 9th Sir Knight Albert Gall was elected Treasurer to fill the vacancy in that office.

November 30th, Eminent Sir Joseph W. Smith, a Past Eminent Commander of Raper Commandery, Grand Treasurer of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, Secretary of the Scottish Rite bodies, Valley of Indianapolis, and Recorder of Murat Temple A. A. O. N. M. S., died at Indianapolis.

In the year 1902 Henri T. Conde was Eminent Commander.

On April 8th, Sir Knight John B. Van Tilburgh, Sentinel of Raper Commandery, died in Indianapolis, and Sir Knight Jacob Rubin was appointed to fill the vacancy.

April 16th, Raper Commandery attended the Annual State Conclave of Knights Templar of Indiana at South Bend and appeared in the parade with other Commanderies of the state.

At the Stated Conclave of the Commandery, held on July 8th, an amendment to Section 2, Article 2 of the by-laws, changing the date of holding the Stated Conclaves from the second Tuesdays to the third Tuesdays, was adopted.

In the year 1903 Henri T. Conde was again Eminent Commander.

On March 25th the Commandery attended the ceremonies of laying the corner-stone of the new Federal Building, corner of Pennsylvania and New York streets, acting as escort to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, F. & A. M., of Indiana.

Sunday evening, April 12th, the Commandery attended Easter Sunday services at Central Avenue Methodist Church, in full Templar uniform, with 53 swords in line.

On April 15th the Commandery attended the annual State Conclave of Knights Templar of Indiana at Fort Wayne, with 44 swords in line.

On Sunday evening, May 24th, the Commandery attended Ascension Day services, they being conducted by the Reverend and Sir Knight Lewis Brown, and the sermon by Reverend and Sir Knight Willis D. Engle, both members of Raper Commandery.

June 1st, attended St. John's Day services at the Scottish Rite Cathedral in the afternoon, with 48 swords in line.

The ceremonies of laying the corner stone of the new Court House at Greencastle was attended October 29th.

In the year 1904 Oliver Willard Pierce was Eminent Commander.

On January 5th the Order of the Temple was conferred on Red Cross Companions Ohio L. Wade and William A. Holt, in the Scottish Rite Cathedral on account of not having sufficient room in the Asylum to accommodate the number of Sir Knights in attendance.

On May 11th exemplified the floor work in the opening of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Indiana in ample

form, and appeared in public at Indianapolis on the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, on which occasion 27 Commanderies of Knights Templar were represented, with approximately 2,000 swords in line.

The Commandery joined with the Scottish Rite bodies on Sunday afternoon, June 26th, in the St. John's Day ceremonies at the Scottish Rite Cathedral.

On December 20th, received the first report of the Executive Committee on the New Masonic Temple, giving a schedule of the probable annual expense and method of financing.

In the year 1905 Hervey B. Fatout was Eminent Commander. January 17th, a public installation of the officers elected for the current year was held at the Scottish Rite Cathedral, attended by Knights Templar, other Masons and their families and friends.

April 23rd, attended Easter Sunday services at the Central Avenue Methodist Church at 7:30 o'clock P. M. in full Templar Uniform.

On June 25th, attended St. John's Day services at the Scottish Rite Cathedral at 2 o'clock P. M.

August 15th, the resignation of Eminent Sir Jacob W. Smith, as Recorder of the Commandery, on account of the duties of the office interfering with other business, was offered and accepted.

September 19th, Sir Knight Howard Kimball was elected and installed in the office of Recorder of the Commandery to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Eminent Sir Jacob W. Smith.

On October 16th, the Commandery attended the funeral services and burial of Eminent Sir Albert Gall, Treasurer of the Commandery, with 57 swords in line.

October 17th, Sir Knight Henry Rebesberger was appointed Treasurer of the Commandery to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Eminent Sir Albert Gall.

In the year 1906 John J. Boaz was Eminent Commander.

On the afternoon of May 9th a fire occurred which destroyed the upper stories of the Masonic Temple building on the corner of Capitol avenue and Washington street, and damaged much of the furniture, paraphernalia and equipment of the Commandery, and uniforms and effects of individual Sir Knights that were in the

Asylum and anterooms at the time, the loss to the Commandery and individual Sir Knights being fully covered by insurance.

On the morning of the day the fire occurred, 50 members of the Commandery left the Union Station for Warsaw and Winona Lake and appeared in the parade with other Commanderies of the state, at the Fifty-third Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery, K. T., of Indiana.

May 10th, a drill team composed of the following named Sir Knights, represented Raper Commandery in the competitive drill and was awarded the first prize of Two Hundred Dollars:

On June 14th a special dispensation was granted by R. E. Grand Commander Oliver Gard for the Commandery to hold its conclaves on the third floor of the building at 41 West Pearl street, on account of the destruction of its Asylum in the Masonic Temple by fire on May 9th, 1906.

June 19th, on behalf of the Commandery, Eminent Commander Boaz presented to Sir Knight Jacob Rubin, the Sentinel of the Commandery, a Knights Templar watch charm, in appreciation of his efforts in saving property of the Commandery during the burning of the Masonic Temple on May 9th last.

In the year 1907 Elias J. Jacoby was Eminent Commander.

May 12th, the Commandery attended Ascension Day services at Greenfield, Indiana, with 42 swords in line, at 11 o'clock A. M., by invitation of Greenfield Commandery No. 39, and together with Commanderies from Franklin and Rushville, assisted Greenfield Commandery in decorating the graves in the cemetery of the departed Knights.

At 7:30 o'clock P. M., the Commandery attended services at the Meridian Street Methodist Church, conducted by Reverend and Sir Knight Joshua Stansfield, with 75 swords in line.

At 3 o'clock P. M., June 23rd, the Commandery, with 45 swords in line, attended St. John's Day service and the memorial service for the departed brethren of the Scottish Rite who had died during the past year, the services being held in the Scottish Rite Temple on South Pennsylvania street. Following the memorial service, a most appropriate and eloquent address on "Immortality" was delivered by Brother and Sir Knight Charles Warren Fairbanks, Vice-President of the United States.

July 7th-11th, the Thirtieth Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar was held at Saratoga, New York, and the Commandery was represented in the Grand Parade with 45 swords in line. On July 10th its drill team participated in the prize drill contests and was awarded the Cathedral Clock Trophy for excellence in drill.

In the year 1908 John Ebert was Eminent Commander and died in office on November 28th of that year.

On May 25th the Commandery, with 225 swords in line, participated in the parade as escort to the Grand Lodge of Indiana and visiting Commanderies of Knights Templar, to attend the service of laying of the corner stone of the new Masonic Temple at the southeast corner of Illinois and North streets.

On June 10th the Commandery was awarded the silver trophy cup for excellence in performing the ceremony of opening a subordinate Commandery in the Auditorium at Winona Lake during the 54th Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, and on June 11th the officers and Sir Knights of the Commandery who participated in the exhibition drill were awarded "honorable mention."

On the afternoon of November 30th the Commandery assem-

bled at the Asylum with 63 swords in line, for the purpose of attending the funeral and burial of Eminent Sir John Ebert, Commander of Raper Commandery, the funeral service being held at the late residence of the deceased and the remains were deposited in Crown Hill Cemetery with Knightly honors.

On December 25th a special assembly of the Commandery was held at the Asylum, 41 West Pearl street, in compliance with the recommendation of the R. E. Sir Charles Day, Grand Commander of Indiana, for Christmas Observance to commemorate the sentiment offered to the Most Eminent Grand Master, Henry Warren Rugg, and his response thereto, the program consisting of an address by Reverend and Sir Knight Joshua Stansfield and vocal musical selections by the Raper Commandery Quartette.

In the year 1909 George M. Spiegel was Eminent Commander.

On the evening of April 11th the Commandery attended Easter Sunday Services at the First English Lutheran Church, Pennsylvania and Walnut streets, by invitation of the pastor, Reverend C. Rollin Schenk, with 92 swords in line.

On Monday, May 24th, at 2:30 P. M., the ceremony of dedication and opening of the new Masonic Temple, southeast corner of Illinois and North streets, took place in accordance with the following program:

Informal Reception by the Indianapolis Masonic Temple Association to members of the Grand Lodge, Masons and their families.

On May 25th the first conclave of the Commandery was held in the new Masonic Temple, southeast corner of Illinois and North streets, on which occasion the Order of the Temple and appendant Orders were conferred upon Red Cross Companions Thomas C. Rutledge and Sheridan Hawkins, there being 246 Sir Knights present, including 100 visitors from other Commanderies.

In the year 1910 Leon T. Leach was Eminent Commander.

On May 10th, at a Special Conclave, a Priory of Knights of Malta was duly constituted and opened in full ceremonial form and the Order of Knight of Malta conferred upon Sir Knight Ross H. Wallace, it being the first time that the Commandery conferred the order in full form and with complete costumes for all who took part in the floor work. An attendance of 194 was noted at this Conclave.

July 19th, on account of the death of Sir Knight Henry Rebesberger, a vacancy occurred in the office of Treasurer of the Commandery and a dispensation having been received from R. E. Sir W. B. Hosford, Grand Commander, to hold a special election for the purpose, Sir Knight Elmer F. Gay was elected to fill the vacancy in the office.

At the Stated Conclaves of August 16th and September 20th letters from the following named were received and read, congratulating the Commandery on the success of its Drill Team in being awarded first prize in the competitive drills at Chicago, at the Thirty-first Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment on August 10th: Franklin Commandery No. 23, K. T., Franklin, Indiana; Board of Directors of the Commercial Club, by Robert G. McClure, secretary; Kenosha Commandery No. 30, K. T., Kenosha, Wisconsin; Hanselman Commandery No. 16, K. T., Cincinnati, Ohio; Harry A. Daly, General Passenger Agent Big Four Route; Colonel H. A. Greene, 10th Infantry, Fort Benjamin Harrison; Captains Ralph E. Ingram and William L. Buck, Fort Benjamin Harrison, and Jesse D. Moore, of Chicago, a former Hoosier.

On December 20th the report of the Committee on Christmas Offerings was approved, recommending a cash donation of \$25.00

to each of the following charity organizations: Indianapolis Orphans Asylum, Home for Friendless Colored Children, Home for Friendless Women, Industrial School for Girls.

In the year 1911 Leslie D. Clancy was Eminent Commander.

On April 16th, Easter Sunday services were held in the Grand Lodge Auditorium in the Masonic Temple at 2:30 P. M., the program consisting of music suitable to the occasion, the Easter Sunday Templar Service and an appropriate address by Reverend and Sir Knight Lewis Brown, the Commandery attending in full Templar uniform with 110 swords in line and 875 Sir Knights and their relatives and friends in attendance at the service.

On December 19th the Commandery adopted the recommendation of the Committee on Christmas Donations that a cash donation of \$25.00 be made as a Christmas offering to each of the following charity organizations: The Salvation Army, the Wheeler Rescue Mission, the Day Nursery, the Colored Orphans Home.

In the year 1912 Edward J. Scoonover was Eminent Commander.

On April 20th a Priory of Knights of Malta was opened in full ceremonial form, the conclave having been called for the purpose of conferring the Order of Malta on Sir Knights Charles J. Orbison and Robert F. Davidson, there being 122 members of the Commandery and 120 members of other Commanderies in attendance.

The occasion marked the visit of Lincoln Park Commandery No. 64, Knights Templar, of Chicago, to Raper Commandery, with eighty of its members in full Templar uniform in line.

Following the conferring of the order, on invitation of Eminent Sir Scoonover for remarks from the visiting Sir Knights, responses were made by Eminent Commander Hallock of Lincoln Park Commandery, Sir Knight William H. Swintz of South Bend Commandery No. 13 and Grand Master F. & A. M. of Indiana, Sir Knight Thomas R. Marshall, Governor of Indiana, and others.

On Sunday evening, June 9th, the Sir Knights assembled at the Asylum and the Eminent Commander announced that this Conclave had been called for the purpose of attending memorial services in honor of Sir Knight Nicholas R. Ruckle at St. Paul's Epis-

copal Church. Lines were formed and the Commandery proceeded to the church, where the services were conductd by Reverend and Sir Knight Lewis Brown, assisted by the Reverend and Sir Knight Christopher S. Sargent.

June 18th Eminent Sir John J. Glendening, Past Commander of Washington Commandery No. 33, K. T., of Washington, Indiana, and Past Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons of Indiana, was unanimously elected an honorary member of Raper Commandery.

December 7th, on invitation of Lincoln Park Commandery No. 64, Knights Templar, of Chicago, for a fraternal visit, twenty-five Sir Knights of Raper Commandery responded to the invitation and witnessed the conferring of the Order of the Temple in the Asylum of Lincoln Park Commandery, after which the visiting Sir Knights were delightfully entertained by their hosts before entraining for the return trip.

On December 25th the usual cash donations were sent as Christmas offerings to the following charity organizations: Wheeler Rescue Mission, Volunteers of America, Home for Aged and Friendless Women, and indigent families, and gifts of flowers to members of the Commandery who were known to be confined to their homes by illness.

In the year 1913 Alexander Rumpler was Eminent Commander.

At the Stated Conclave of January 21st the following telegrams were received and read and ordered placed on the records:

On February 18th a printed extract from the sermon of Reverend and Sir Knight Lewis Brown at the funeral services of Past Eminent Commander John T. Brush was ordered framed and hung in an appropriate place in the Commandery social room.

May 14th the Commandery attended the State Conclave of Knights Templar of Indiana, at Crawfordsville, and in the parade had sixty-five Sir Knights in full Templar uniform, and following the parade were entertained at lunch by the Crawfordsville Commandery at the former country home of General Lew Wallace.

On August 12th to 15th the Commandery attended the Tri-

cnnial Conclave of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States at Denver, Colorado, with sixty swords in line in the grand parade on August 12th, and its Drill Team was awarded first prize in the competitive drills on August 13th, with a percentage for excellence in drill and in appearance of 99.28 per cent.

In the year 1914 Louis G. Buddenbaum was Eminent Commander.

May 17th the Commandery attended Ascension Day services at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, by invitation of Reverend and Sir Knight Lewis Brown, rector of the church, who conducted the services and delivered the sermon on the occasion, the Commandery appearing in full Templar uniform with 105 swords in line.

On September 24th the Commandery attended the ceremonies of the laying of the corner stone of the new Masonic Temple at Noblesville, Indiana, with fifty Sir Knights in full Templar uniform in the parade. Following the corner stone laying ceremonies, an exhibition drill was given by Raper Drill Corps which was witnessed by a large and appreciative audience of Masons and their friends.

October 10th a fraternal visit was made to the Commandery by Englewood Commandery No. 59, of Englewood, Illinois, nearly one hundred members from that Commandery making the pilgrimage to Indianapolis.

In the year 1915 John W. Swanton was Eminent Commander. March 16th the Mystic Tie class of 1914, through Sir Knight John H. Rader, presented to the Commandery a class picture of its members which was received and ordered hung in the social room of the Commandery.

On March 16th Eminent Sir Robert Archer Woods, Eminent Commander of Princeton Commandery No. 46, Knights Templar, of Princeton, Indiana, and Past Grand High Priest of Royal Arch Masons of Indiana, was elected to honorary membership in Raper Commandery.

On May 26th the Commandery, with forty-eight swords in line, acting as escort to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge F. & A. M. of Indiana, attended the ceremonies of laying the corner stone of the Masonic Temple of Oriental Lodge No. 500, F. & A. M., at

Central avenue and Twenty-second street. Following the corner stone laying ceremonies an address was delivered by Brother Charles Warren Fairbanks, a member of Oriental Lodge and of Raper Commandery.

On October 21st members of the Commandery assembled at the Asylum at 1 o'clock for the purpose of acting as escort to the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, F. & A. M., of Indiana, to attend the ceremonies incident to the laying of the corner stone of the Indiana Masons' Widows' and Orphans' Home at Franklin, Indiana. The Commandery, with 150 swords in line, escorted the Grand Lodge officers and a large number of Master Masons of various Lodges of the city and state to the Union Station, arriving at Franklin by special train at 2:30 o'clock. The parade of the various Masonic bodies to the site of the Home, the ceremonies incident to the corner stone laying and an exhibition drill by Raper Commandery Drill Corps concluded the program of the day.

In the year 1916 Isaac B. Pickett was Eminent Commander.

On January 18th the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) was ordered donated to the Indiana Masons' Widows' and Orphans' Home at Franklin, Indiana, for the purpose of providing the furniture for the library in the room at the Home designated for that purpose and to be known as the "Raper Commandery Knights Templar room."

At the conclave of May 16th R. E. Sir Adrian Hamersly, Past Grand Commander of Knights Templar of Indiana, a member of Washington Commandery No. 33, K. T., was elected to honorary membership in Raper Commandery.

On June 20th Raper Commandery was represented by sixtyone Sir Knights at the Thirty-third Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the United States, at Los Angeles, California; by appearing in the grand parade on June 20th; and on June 21st its Drill Corps was awarded second prize for efficiency in drill in the drill contests held on that date.

On November 1st a resolution was adopted to donate an additional amount of \$150.00 to complete the furnishing of the "Raper Commandery Room" at the Masonic Home at Franklin, Indiana.

December 19th a Christmas offering of \$100.00 was donated to the Indiana Masons' Widows' and Orphans' Home at Franklin.

In the year 1917 Harry L. Morrison was Eminent Commander.

At 7:30 on the evening of April 8th the Commandery attended Easter Sunday services at the Meridian Street Methodist Church, where Reverend and Sir Knight Frank LaFayette Loveland was pastor, with 150 swords in line.

On March 26th a donation of \$250.00 was ordered sent to New Albany Commandery No. 5, K. T., for the relief of Masons and their families in New Albany who suffered losses through the cyclone which occurred in that vicinity on March 23rd.

On May 9th the Commandery assembled at the Asylum at 7:00 o'clock A. M. and marched from there to the Union Station and by special train arrived at Kokomo at 10:50 o'clock A. M. for the purpose of attending the Sixty-third Annual State Conclave K. T. of Indiana. The Commandery, with seventy-five swords in line, participated in the parade of the Commanderies of the state which were in attendance.

On May 19th, on invitation of Anderson Commandery No. 32, K. T., of Anderson, Indiana, sixty members of the Commandery visited that city, arriving at 7:15 o'clock P. M., and after being entertained at a banquet, proceeded to the Asylum of Anderson Commandery and conferred the Order of the Temple in due form.

On June 19th a resolution was adopted that the dues of members of Raper Commandery, serving the United States Government in Military or Naval service, be remitted during their term of service in the present war, and also that a donation be made, in conjunction with other Masonic bodies meeting in the Temple, for the purpose of entertaining Masons stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison, and on November 20th a donation of five hundred dollars was contributed to the Y. M. C. A. war fund.

On December 11th occurred the Biennial Inspection by Eminent Sir Olin E. Holloway, Inspector General, with an attendance of sixty-six.

In the year 1918 Charles S. Barker was Eminent Commander.

On January 15th V. E. Sir Leonidas Perry Newby, of Knightstown, Indiana, the present Grand Senior Warden of the Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the U. S. and Past Grand Com-

mander, K. T. of Indiana, was elected to honorary membership in Raper Commandery.

The Recorder reported the receipt of two hundred and twenty dollars (\$220.00), contributed by 195 members of the Commandery, to the Emergency War Fund of the Grand Encampment, K. T. of the U. S., in response to General Order No. 7 of the Grand Master and General Order No. 3 of the Acting Grand Commander.

On March 31st the Commandery, escorted by Franklin Commandery No. 23, K. T., attended Easter services at 3 o'clock P. M. in the Chapel at the Masonic Home at Franklin, Indiana, with sixty-five swords in line, where the principal address of the occasion was delivered by Sir Knight Charles J. Orbison of Raper Commandery.

On May 7th and 8th the Commandery left in a special car of the Vandalia railroad for Evansville, to attend the Sixty-fourth Annual State Conclave of the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of Indiana, the party, including fifty-two Sir Knights and ladies, arriving in Evansville at 6:00 o'clock P. M. On the afternoon of May 8th the Commandery joined with other Commanderies of the State in the grand parade. At this session of the Grand Commandery the following members of Raper Commandery were elected to office in the Grand Commandery of Indiana:

Henri T. Conde was elected Deputy Grand Commander, Vestal W. Woodward was elected Grand Treasurer, Edward J. Scoonover was elected Grand Warder, and Jacob Rubin was elected Grand Captain of the Guard.

On Saturday, May 25th, the Commandery made a fraternal visit to Apollo Commandery No. 1, K. T. of Chicago, Illinois, leaving Indianapolis by special train at noon and arriving in Chicago at 5 o'clock P. M., and were received by Apollo Commandery and escorted to its Asylum where, after a banquet and the presentation to Raper Commandery of an elaborate "Key to Chicago," the Order of the Temple was conferred by Apollo Commandery. On the following day the visitors were fraternally entertained and at 5 o'clock P. M. returned to Indianapolis.

On the evening of June 23rd the Commandery, with forty-five swords in line, attended St. John's Day services at the Central

Universalist Church, the sermon on the occasion being delivered by the pastor, Reverend and Sir Knight Lucius R. Page.

On December 17th a contribution in the sum of one hundred dollars was donated to the Masonic Home at Franklin, Indiana, as a Christmas offering. Sir Vestal W. Woodward, who had served in the office of Prelate for thirty years, declined re-election to that office and Reverend Lewis Brown was elected Prelate at this conclave.

1. Having been honored with the election of Grand Commander by the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of Indiana, at its last Annual Conclave held at Indianapolis on May 14th and 15th, I herewith assume command of the Order in Indiana for the ensuing year.

2. The present year will be one of special interest and importance among Knights Templar on account of its being Triennial year, when the Triennial of the Order will be held in the city of Philadelphia, Pa., from September 6th to September 12th, 1919. On account of the closing of the great World's War the exercises will partake largely of a patriotic nature, which will give this, the Thirty-fourth Triennial, a nation-wide significance.

3. The great parade, which always forms a brilliant feature at all Triennials, will take place on Tuesday, September 9th. This parade is always formed in division formation, each state, if well represented, being arranged in division formation and headed by the Grand Commandery of the State. It is therefore hoped that the attendance from Indiana will warrant it forming a separate division, and known as the Indiana division.

Raper Commandery with its famous Drill Team, which has brought so much honor to Indiana by reason of the numerous prizes won on the fields of former Triennials, and which has put the Templars of Indiana on the map, will doubtless head the division."

On September 8th to 11th the Commandery attended the Thirtyfourth Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the United States, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and participated in the Grand Parade and other functions incident to the occasion, winning second prize in the drill contest.

On September 25th the Commandery made a fraternal visit to New Castle Commandery No. 44, K. T., of New Castle, Indiana, and witnessed the conferring of the Order of the Temple in the Asylum of that Commandery, and were entertained in the evening by a banquet and social gathering.

At the stated conclave of the Commandery, held on December 16th, the following General Order of the Grand Commander was received and read:

Christmas Observance, 1919.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Commandery and the Officers and Members of Constituent Commanderies, Knights Templar of Indiana, Greeting:

The following sentiment has been prepared for the coming Christmas observance:

To Joseph Kyle Orr, Most Eminent Grand Master:

In this hour of greatest prosperity to our Order, which it shares alike with our nation and its people, let us not forget our pledge to defend and, if need be, draw the sword in the defense of innocent maidens, helpless orphans, destitute widows and the Christian religion.

The Grand Master sends the following response: Sir Knights:

This toast is timely. Its sentiment is a call and challenge to all humanity. The ancient Templar drew his sword as a symbol of sacrifice, and with it pledged his future, his fortune and his life.

He purified his soul in the melting pot of adversity and met his downfall in the perils of prosperity. A nation is as strong as the character of its people. Prosperity is too often the real test of character. From the present pinnacle of national opulence, which many think threatens the safety of society, may the Heavenly Father lead us back to that safe and sane level where we may more often hear that world-old query, "Am I my brother's keeper?" Fortunately, real happiness is not confined to what the world calls money makers. Those whose lives have brought the greatest blessings to humanity have rarely had time to found a fortune. Some there are who have tried and failed and tried again. I am not one who believes that fickle dame, Opportunity, comes but once. Rather do I incline to agree with the one who makes her say:

"They do me wrong who say I come no more

When once I knock and fail to find you in,

For every day I stand outside your door

And bid you wake and rise to fight and win."

A son of Pennsylvania moved into the South and became a great captain of industry. It was his frequent prayer: "Lord, Thou hast abundantly blessed me. I pray that this may not harden my heart." How appropriate this petition on this natal day of our Lord and Master. Despised and rejected of men, He lived in the valley of humility, yet he moulded the conscience of a world. In our day men amass great fortunes; they pass away and are soon forgotten.

He longest lives

Who for others serves and gives,

Himself forgetting.

And now, Sir Knights, as we close this momentous year, and enter upon the third decade of this epoch-making century, may I share with you the help I have found in a favorite prayer of Phillips Brooks?

"Give us this day our daily bread, we pray,

And give us too, dear Lord, our daily thought,

That our poor souls may strengthen as they ought

And starve not on the husks of yesterday."

In the year 1920 Charles C. Kuhn was Eminent Commander.

On February 8th the Commandery, with eighty swords in line, attended the funeral and performed the Templar burial service of Eminent Sir Isaac Brown Pickett, Past Eminent Commander of Raper Commandery, at his late residence in Greenfield, Ind.

On August 1st Eminent Sir Calvin W. Prather, Recorder of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, and an honorary member of Raper Commandery, died at his residence in Indianapolis, and on September 13th, 1920, Eminent Sir William H. Swintz of South Bend Commandery No. 13 was appointed by the Grand Commander to fill the vacancy in the office of Grand Recorder.

In the year 1921 William D. Kerlin was Eminent Commander.

On Sunday evening, March 27th, the Commandery attended Easter services at St. Paul's Episcopal Church by invitation of Reverend and Sir Knight Lewis Brown, the Excellent Prelate of the Commandery. Fifty Sir Knights in full Templar uniform attended the services.

On May 11th, at 9:30 o'clock A. M., the Commandery escorted the officers of the Grand Commandery of Indiana from the Claypool Hotel to the Masonic Temple, and during the forenoon acted as escort in receiving the visiting Commanderies of the state in attendance at the Sixty-seventh Annual Conclave. In the afternoon the Commandery participated in the Grand Parade, with over six hundred swords in line, and at 6:00 o'clock P. M. exemplified, in the Asylum, the work in the Order of Malta in full ceremonial form, at the request of the officers of the Grand Commandery and the visiting Sir Knights.

A reception by the officers of the Grand Commandery and a social affair in the Temple concluded the day's program.

At the stated conclave on May 17th the thanks of the Commandery were extended to Eminent Sir Edward J. Scoonover, Captain of the Drill Corps, for presenting to the Commandery the watch allotted to him at the Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in September, 1919, and to Sir Knight Alfred B. Lyon for his gift of the exhibition case used in the display of the watch in the social room of the Commandery.

On May 28th the Commandery acted as escort to the M. W. Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. of Indiana, and Calvin W. Prather

Lodge No. 717, F. & A. M., at the ceremonies of laying of the corner-stone of the Masonic Temple of Prather Lodge at the northwest corner of College avenue and Forty-second street. The Commandery, with its Drill Corps and Drum and Bugle Corps, participated in the parade with 125 swords in line.

On Sunday, June 26th, the Commandery, with forty swords in line, attended St. John's Day ceremonies of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, in the Murat Temple Auditorium.

On September 7th the Commandery attended memorial services at the Sutherland Avenue Presbyterian Church in memory of Sir Knight Harry Hunter, who died at sea August 29th, 1921, while on a steamship returning from Europe, and who was buried at sea on September 2nd, 1921.

On Sunday afternoon, October 30th, the Commandery participated in the joint ceremonies of the dedication of the Memorial Fountain, presented by Raper Commandery, and the Entrance Arch, presented by Indianapolis Chapter No. 5 and Keystone Chapter No. 6, Royal Arch Masons, to the Indiana Masonic Home at Franklin.

The presentation address of the Memorial Fountain was delivered by Reverend and Sir Knight Lewis Brown on behalf of the Commandery, and the acceptance address by Sir Knight Frank E. Gavin on behalf of the Trustees of the Home.

An address followed on "Masonry and the Masonic Home" by Sir Knight Charles J. Orbison, Past Grand Master of the M. W. Grand Lodge, F. & A. M., the exercises being interspersed with instrumental and vocal music by children of the Home.

In the year 1922 Brandt C. Downey was Eminent Commander.

On February 21st the Commandery voted to contribute the sum of \$310.80, being 20 cents per capita of its membership, for the expenses of organization of the Order of DeMolay.

On Sunday afternoon, April 16th, the Commandery, with 250 swords in line, met at the Asylum in full Templar uniform and marched to the Cadle Tabernacle, at the northwest corner of Alabama and Ohio streets, where the Templar Easter services were conducted under the direction of the Eminent Commander and Excellent Prelate, followed by an address by Sir Knight Robert J. Aley, President of Butler College, on "Knights Templar Ideals and Hopes," the exercises of the **af**ternoon being inter-

spersed with appropriate vocal selections by the Cadle Tabernacle Choir.

The Commandery attended the Thirty-fifth Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States, held at New Orleans on April 25th to 28th, and, with its Drill Corps and Drum and Bugle Corps, was conspicuous in the Grand Parade. The Drill Corps, in the competitive drills with other Commanderies, was a marked and decided favorite with the vast audience that witnessed the drill contest.

At the numerous entertainments and receptions tendered the Raper party en route to New Orleans and in that city, the Commandery was particularly fortunate in having with it the wives and daughters of its members who were so well qualified to represent the Commandery socially.

At 2:00 o'clock on the afternoon of Wednesday, May 10th, the Commandery, with two hundred swords in line, participated in the parade incident to the proceedings of the Sixty-eighth Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Indiana, and at 6:00 o'clock assembled in the Asylum for the purpose of conferring the Order of the Temple at the request of the officers of the Grand Commandery and Sir Knights in attendance from other Commanderies in the state, there being 176 visiting Sir Knights at the conclave.

On the afternoon of Sunday, June 25th, the Commandery, with fifty-two swords in line, attended the St. John's Day memorial service of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite at the Murat Temple.

On December 2nd the Commandery participated in the ceremonies of laying the corner-stone of the new Lodge building of Veritas Lodge No. 608, F. & A. M., at Adams street and Roosevelt avenue. The Commandery, with its Drill Corps and Drum and Bugle Corps, acted as escort to the M. W. Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. of Indiana, and Veritas Lodge.

In the year 1923 Calvin W. Busch was Eminent Commander.

At the stated conclave on February 20th, Eminent Sir Elwood Barnard, a member of Greenfield Commandery No. 39, of Greenfield, Indiana, and Inspector-General of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, was elected an honorary member of Raper Commandery.

On Sunday evening, April 1st, the Commandery, with sixty swords in line, attended Easter services at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, conducted by Reverend Lewis Brown, Excellent Prelate of the Commandery.

On Sunday afternoon, May 13th, the Commandery attended the consecration services of the Boys' Building, erected by funds contributed by the Knights Templar of Indiana, at the Masonic Home at Franklin, Indiana. Raper Commandery, with its Drill Corps and Drum and Bugle Corps, followed by other Commanderies of the state, led the parade to the Masonic Home grounds, where the ceremonies were conductd by officers of the Grand Commandery of Indiana before a large assemblage of Knights Templar, members of other Masonic bodies and citizens.

At the stated conclave held on May 15th, Sir Knight Charles F. Neu, Chairman of the Boys' Building Fund Committee, submitted a verbal report to the Commandery of the collection of the funds as reported to him by the following report of the secretary of the committee:

In the year 1924 Charles F. Neu was Eminent Commander.

On Sunday evening, April 20th, the Commandery, with 115 swords in line, attended Easter services at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, conducted by the Reverend Lewis Brown, the Excellent Prelate of the Commandery.

On May 14th the Commandery attended the Seventieth Annual State Conclave of the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of Indiana, and, by request, conferred the Order of Malta in full ceremonial form in the Asylum of Fort Wayne Commandery No. 4, K. T., and on May 23rd received the following communication:

At the stated conclave of the Commandery held on July 15th, Sir Knight John W. McAdams, a member of Greenfield Commandery No. 39, K. T., was elected an honorary member of Raper Commandery.

On July 16th the Commandery, with forty-one swords in line, attended the ceremonies of laying the corner-stone of the new Masonic Temple at Greencastle, Indiana, on invitation of Temple Lodge No. 47, F. & A. M., and acted as escort to the M. W. Grand Lodge, F. & A. M. of Indiana, and Temple Lodge in the parade to the site of the new Temple.

On August 7th members of the Commandery visited Bloomington, Indiana, on invitation of Monroe Lodge No. 22, F. & A. M., of that city and participated in the ceremonies of laying the corner-stone of its new Masonic Temple. At each of these cornerstone-laying ceremonies the Drill Team attended and put on an exhibition drill.

At the stated conclave of the Commandery held on September 16th, the Committee on the History of Raper Commandery was discharged and the Eminent Commander appointed Sir Knights Lewis Brown, Frank Bowers and Howard Kimball as a new committee. Perry Newby, Most Eminent Grand Master of Knights Templar of the United States, assisted by Edward J. Scoonover, Right Eminent Grand Commander of Indiana, acting as Grand Marshal.

In the year 1925 Oscar L. Pond was Eminent Commander.

On February 10th the Commandery acted as escort to the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite at the funeral and burial services of Brother and Sir Knight Calvin W. Busch, a member and Past Eminent Commander of Raper Commandery.

On Sunday evening, April 12th, the Commandery, following the usual custom, attended Easter Sunday services at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, where services were conducted by the rector of the church, Reverend Sir Lewis Brown, Prelate of Raper Commandery and Grand Prelate of the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of Indiana.

At the stated conclave of the Commandery held on April 21st, Eminent Sir William H. Swintz, a member and Past Commander of South Bend Commandery No. 13, K. T., and present Grand Recorder of Knights Templar of Indiana, was elected an honorary member of Raper Commandery.

At 2:00 o'clock Tuesday, May 12th, the Commandery, with 218 swords in line, participated in the Grand Parade with other Commanderies of the state on the occasion of the Seventy-first Annual State Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Indiana, and at 5:00 o'clock conferred the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross in the Commandery Asylum, when the elaborate new scenery for the Order was first used, there being 137 visiting Sir Knights present from other Commanderies.

At the election of officers of the Grand Commandery, May 14th, Sir Knight Charles F. Neu, of Raper Commandery, was elected and installed Grand Warder of the Grand Commandery.

The Commandery attended the Thirty-sixth Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the United States, at Seattle, Washington, July 28th to 31st, accompanied by its Drill Team and Choir, leaving Indianapolis on July 18th on the Grand Master Escort train, arriving in Seattle on July 25th, and in the competitive drill the Raper Drill Team was awarded the fourth prize.

On September 29th the Commandery visited Chicago, Illinois, on invitation of Chicago Commandery No. 19, Knights Templar,





TRIENNIAL CONCLAVES



Triennial Conclaves

The first Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment in which any Indiana Commanderies were present and assigned to a place in the usual parade incidental to such occasions was held at Baltimore, Maryland, on September 21, 1871. As has been mentioned, tentative preparations were made to attend that gathering of Templars from all parts of the reunited Nation, but for some undiscovered reason Raper Commandery does not seem to have been present, as no mention of their presence is made in the order of assignments for the parade. Greencastle Commandery No. 11 with six men and Terre Haute Commandery No. 16 with one hundred forty-two men, led by a band of sixteen musicians, constituted the entire sixth division of the procession as formed. The Grand Commandery of Indiana was represented in the Grand Encampment by Sir E. G. Hamilton, Right Eminent Grand Commander; Sir Chas. Cruft, Deputy Right Eminent Grand Commander; Sir Christian Fitta, Eminent Grand Generalissimo, and Sir George Fish, Eminent Grand Captain-General.

About this time the Commandery entered upon a period of greater activites—one reason perhaps being the growing desire on the part of the newer members to appear in public as a uniformed body. Sirs Nicholas R. Ruckle, George J. Branham, Henry C. Adams, Henry M. Mounts, Isaac Thalman, and Will J. Kercheval-these and others, who had served as soldiers in the Civil War, were created Sir Knights in 1867, 1868, 1869, and 1870, and their desire to form a "drill squad" was fully approved. The matter of rules and regulations was left entirely to Sir Knight Ruckle, who was Eminent Commander in 1872. All members were eligible to assignment therein, but attending nine regular practice drills in succession was necessary for permanent membership, and absence from four of them reduced the derelict to the waiting list. Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle was selected as the drill master, and his decision as to who should participate in any public parade was final. The desire for the formation of a drill squad was doubtless emphasized by the visit of Hanselman Commandery No. 16 of Cincinnati, Ohio, as the special guest of Raper, on April 3, 1872, during the annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, which was held at Indianapolis on that date.

This was the first appearance of any fully uniformed Commandery on the streets of Indianapolis. The visitors were met at the "Union Depot," and, with the Newport Barracks Band leading, Hanselman Commandery was escorted to the Bates House, where breakfast was served. In the afternoon lines were formed for a parade through several of the principal down-town streets with Raper leading, followed by Hanselman No. 16 and the Grand Commandery officers and representatives. After a short rest "Hanselman Commandery returned to the intersection of Washington and Delaware streets and in front of the Court House gave an exhibition drill which was witnessed by a large concourse of people. With their conspicuous and elegant uniforms and their marvelous precision and perfection of movements, they made a most magnificent appearance and were roundly applauded. Returning to the Masonic Temple two hours were spent at the banquet table, where speeches and good fellowship reigned. The visitors expressed great pleasure over their visit and for the many courtesies extended to them while here. Soon after they left for their homes, singing as the train departed, "Should auld acquaintance be forgot." This visitation seemed to be an inspiration to the members of Raper and in a short time all members were equipped with regulation uniforms, and the real work of drilling the Commandery began with the good results which followed later.

On June 11, 1872, the Commandery with thirty-five Sir Knights in line visited Columbus, Indiana, as the special guest of Thomas H. Lynch Commandery No. 14, and participated with other Masonic bodies in the ceremonies of laying the corner-stone of the Bartholomew County Court House. On that occasion Sir Knight Nicholas R. Ruckle acted as marshal of the parade, Sir Ora Pearson conducted the musical program and Sir Byron K. Elliott delivered the oration of the day.

The history of Indianapolis with a population varying from five thousand to seven thousand, between 1848 and 1861, shows that a majority of the public men and the leaders in the civic, religious, social and political life of the city were also the noted members of Raper Commandery. Statistics show that the leading personnel of most of the societies, churches, and other organizations change every twenty years. Raper Commandery experienced such conditions, which were caused by deaths, withdrawals,

and the formation of other Commanderies in other parts of the State, so that the number of members at the close of the year 1871 was seventy-five. Notwithstanding the transitions during the first decade many of the newer members also became controlling leaders in the commercial, social and other activities of the city, as will appear from an examination of the list of names of its members. The year closed with nineteen names added to the roster and a marked improvement in its financial affairs.

Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle continued to serve as Eminent Commander in 1873. The Commandery had become so well known that its presence was much in demand, as evidenced by frequent invitations from other Masonic bodies to participate on ceremonial and public occasions. For this reason and also because of the unprecedented number of petitions received, which necessitated frequent special conclaves, it was only possible to accept an invitation from the Masonic bodies of Louisville, Kentucky. This was in celebration of St. John's Day and the proceeds arising from these incidental entertainments were used for the benefit of the Masonic Widow's and Orphan's Home of Kentucky.

As the membership increased the younger element continued to manifest greater interest in the tactics and the "drill squad" continued to gain recruits. To further that feature of the Commandery as a help to the frequent social entertainments a guarantee fund was raised to meet current expenses. Twenty-four additions to the membership were made by the close of this year.

The year 1874 was more eventful. Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle was again elected Eminent Commander, and early in the year upon his demand, a resolution was adopted declaring it "is an offence against Templar Masonry for any Sir Knight in uniform to enter a saloon, and that charges would be preferred against him, if he did so, followed by suspension or expulsion.

On April 22nd, fraternal courtesies and entertainment were extended to visiting Commanderies from Richmond, Muncie and Fort Wayne, at the Exposition Building during the afternoon and at the Asylum in the evening. The celebration of the Twentysixth anniversary of the Commandery, counting from the date of the first meeting U. D., occurred on May 14th. This was the first formal observance of an anniversary, and from a private scrap-book it is learned that "It was a grand affair in all its de-

tails, and an event in Templar Masonry in Indiana long to be remembered by all who participated in it. As the morning trains began to arrive on the different roads, delegates came pouring in from every direction. The visiting Commanderies as they arrived, were met at the depot by Raper Commandery and escorted to Masonic Hall, where the Sir Knights were dismissed until 1 o'clock P. M., each being furnished with a ticket for a dinner at one of the principal hotels.

At the appointed time the Sir Knights assembled promptly at Masonic Hall and the column formed on Tennessee street, the right resting on Washington street. At half-past one the order to march was given, and the column moved off in the following order:

In the rear were several carriages, in which were seated the following distinguished visitors: Enoch T. Carson, G. C. of Ohio; J. H. Bostwick, G. C. of Kentucky; George Frank Gouley, P. G. C. and G. R., of Missouri; William H. Hacker, P. G. C. of In-

diana; Charles C. Keifer, D. G. C. of Ohio; Charles Cruft, P. G. C. of Indiana; Brigadier General John Simonson, U.S. Army; Rev. E. C. Van Cleve, Grand Prelate of Ohio, and others. The line of march was east on Washington street to Delaware street, north to New York street, west to Meridian, and north to the Exposition building. On both sides of the streets for the entire distance, a vast crowd of people enjoyed the fine music and closely watched the evolutions of the Commanderies as they marched by threes, sixes, twelves, or formed the cross or triangle, as was repeatedly done by several of them. The march was a tiresome one, owing to the heat and dust, but no Sir Knight faltered or fell out by the way, and all entered the Exposition building with a firm tread, keeping excellent step to the music. Within the building had assembled some fifteen hundred people, one half, at least, being ladies, to witness the drill of the Commanderies, which had been announced as a part of the program of the day. An hour was allowed the Sir Knights for rest and social intercourse, which was enlivened by some excellent music by the several bands present, before the drill commenced. Hanselman Commandery first took the floor. It had the reputation of being one of the best drilled in the United States, and when the order was given to "fall in," the spectators all began to seek the most favorable position for The frequent rounds of applause which complimentinspection. ed the Sir Knights, as they executed the most difficult evolutions with great precision, told how well the audience was pleased, and that this Commandery had well earned its wide-spread reputa-The clapping of hands, as the Sir Knights marched off the tion. floor, no doubt made the Sir Knights of Raper Commandery feel a little nervous as they fell in line for drill. This was only natural, as it was the first appearance of most of them in a public drill. But they stepped out with a bold step, and it soon became apparent that the honors were to be pretty nearly equally divided, and if there was any difference, Raper Commandery came in for the largest share.

There was a marked difference in the movements of the two Commanderies, for Hanselman drilled with a short step, about twenty inches, and in slow time, which rendered mistakes less liable and much easier to correct. Raper took a full twenty-eight

inch step and with about one-fourth faster time, which made some of the evolutions much more difficult to execute in the available limited space.

Sorrow was expressed that none of the other Commanderies had an opportunity to drill, especially Columbus Commandery No. 14, which was known to have been well drilled, but the hour for the banquet having arrived, the Sir Knights were directed to fall in line with their ladies and march to the tables. It is, perhaps, needless to say that this movement was well and promptly executed. The banquet was prepared under the superintendance of Sir Knight Gray of the Spencer House, and none knew better how to provide for such an occasion. After all were seated at the tables. Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle, Eminent Commander of Raper Commandery, in a brief address, most courteously welcomed the guests of his Commandery. Owing to the great length of the tables, three in number, it was impossible for more than one-half of those seated to hear the address, or the toasts and responses which followed.

The first toast was, "To the Grand Commandery of Ohio," which was responded to by Sir John D. Caldwell, of Cincinnati, G. R. of Ohio. From the frequent applause during his remarks they were well timed and were well received.

The next toast, "To the Grand Commandery of Kentucky," was happily responded to by J. H. Bostwick, G. C. of Kentucky.

Toasts to the Grand Commandery of Missouri, and the Grand Commandery of Indiana followed without response.

The last toast, "To the Ladies," was handsomely responded to by Sir E. P. Van Cleve, G. P. of Ohio.

Such Commanderies as desired to return home on the evening trains now withdrew in order to reach their respective trains, but a large number of Sir Knights and their ladies remained to enjoy the pleasures of the dance which was to follow. Under the inspiring influence of the excellent music of the Academy of Music, the orchestra, which had been secured for the occasion, caused all evidences of weariness, consequent on the long march and the drill of the Sir Knights, soon to disappear, and the dancing continued until a late hour.

Thus ended the celebration of the 26th anniversary of the introduction of Templar Masonry in Indiana. That it was a grand

success in every particular is the verdict of all who, in any way, participated in it, and that Raper Commandery was entitled to much credit for her liberality in providing for her guests, and the very courteous manner in which they were entertained, was the unanimous opinion of every Sir Knight present.

Numerous invitations for the Commandery to participate in celebrating St. John the Baptist's Day on May 27th were received, and that of Western Star Lodge No. 26 of Danville, Indiana, was accepted. Nearly fifty Sir Knights made that pilgrimage, as a courtesy to several Sir Knights of the Commandery who resided in Danville.

During the same month the by-laws were changed and the fees for the Orders of Knighthood were increased to fifty dollars. Three hundred and twenty Sir Knights had been enrolled, when the year 1874 ended with one hundred and forty-five still retaining membership.

The year 1875 opened with bright prospects. Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle continued as Eminent Commander, and as further evidence of their esteem and appreciation of his untiring efforts, on Jan. 8th the Commandery presented him with an elegant Sword and Belt.

On May 14th the Commandery participated in the celebration of the eighth anniversary of Terre Haute Commandery No. 15 in that city and was received and entertained with much ceremony.

The Masonic Hall had been remodeled and the Commandery, after a few months tenancy in the Aetna Block, during the interim, returned to the rearranged and more spacious quarters and gradually refurnished and equipped the Asylum with facilities which for a long period thereafter fully served every purpose. In addition to the expense incurred by the Commandery for this purpose, individual contributions aggregating nearly a thousand dollars were made toward the furnishings and decorations. An inventory of all properties showed a valuation in excess of twentyfive hundred dollars. The annual dues were raised to ten dollars, and while this action resulted in a large loss in the membership temporarily, all the pressing indebtedness was soon after cancelled and many of the objecting members renewed their affiliations. At the annual conclave of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, in 1875 Eminent Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle was elected

Right Eminent Grand Commander, and at the stated conclave in June he resigned his office in Raper Commandery. At the same conclave the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That while reluctantly surrendering our late 'Eminent' to a 'Right Eminent' position we do hereby certify our belief that Right Eminent Sir Ruckle will 'bear his blushing honors thick upon him' in the Grand body even as he has for years past wrought a good work in the 'pent up Utica' of Raper Commanderv: that we do hereby certify that while under the command of our beloved Frater the progress of Raper Commandery, in work, in tactics and in drill, has ever been onward and upward and that his study, skill and assiduity have brought this Commandery to the point of excellence it has now attained; that the example and emulation of our retiring Commander are worthy of all imitation, and that we will honestly endeavor to take no step in retreat; that we rejoice in the promise made by our Right Eminent Grand Commander that he will continue to feel and exercise a deep and abiding love for Raper Commandery and assist and immediately direct its officers and Sir Knights in the discharge of their labors and duties; that the above mentioned promise has softened the pangs of parting and we rejoice that instead of exclaiming 'Hail and Farewell,' our shout may be for a long future 'Farewell and Hail.' "

The Right Eminent Grand Commander was then requested and graciously assented to continue to act as Drill Master for the "Drill Squad," then assuming a degree of proficiency to be reckoned with should they continue to improve and participate in exhibition and competitive drill, then more or less popular within the Order.


The Twenty-Eighth Anniversary was observed on the evening of May 24th in the Masonic Grand Lodge Hall and was an enjoyable occasion. There were present sixty Sir Knights in full uniform, and twice that number of ladies and children, for the event was considered a reunion of the members and their families more than a celebration. Right Eminent Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle acted as master of ceremonies.

As a part of the evening program the uniformed members were divided into two companies and Sirs Joseph W. Smith and Henry C. Adams were appointed Captains to compete with each other

for drill honors, which, judging from the length and volume of applause following each exhibition, were closely contested for the prize which was awarded for proficiency in drill movement to Captain Adams' Company. Another feature of the evening, quietly prearranged by the ladies, occurred when Sir Augustus D. Lynch on their behalf presented to the Commandery a beautifully bound and properly inscribed Bible, as a token of esteem and slight evidence of their interest in its affairs. The master of ceremonies accepted the gift in brief but impressive words of appreciation and thanks to the donors. This Bible is still in possession of the Commandery in a good state of preservation, and is frequently used in ceremonial work. A bounteous banquet was served and dancing concluded the evening entertainment.

Sir John G. Pendergast was selected by special election to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Eminent Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle, and served as Eminent Commander for the remaining months of 1875, and was re-elected for the year 1876. On July 1st there was again a pressing need for funds and the dues were raised from five to ten dollars, at which figure they remained for one year, and were then reduced to six dollars. Although the membership at this time was not large, in their desire to have more inviting and convenient apartments, voluntary contributions were made by the Sir Knights, and nearly one thousand dollars were raised and expended for new furnishings and fixtures. This resulted in better attendance at all conclaves and caused an increased interest to be manifested in the Commandery.

Sir Henry C. Adams followed as Eminent Commander in 1877. After the Presidential election of 1876, general business was somewhat disturbed because of the unsettled question of who had been elected President of the United States, and this naturally diverted the attention of many citizens, and affected many enterprises. However Raper's membership was increased by nine accessions during the year. The sixty uniformed Sir Knights continued their drilling and otherwise gave close attention to perfecting themselves in Asylum and outdoor tactical movements, in anticipation of their attendance at the Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment later in the year.

Raper Commandery first came into prominence as a welldrilled organization at the Triennial Encampment held at Cleveland, Ohio, in August, 1877, when it entered as a competitor for honors in the exhibition drills, which were one of the features of that occasion. This was the first appearance of Raper away from home. Detroit No. 1, St. Paul No. 1, Cincinnati No. 3, Monroe No. 12 of Rochester, New York; Hanselman No. 16 of Cincinnati, Hugh De Pageas No. 10 of Buffalo, New York, St. Bernard No. 35 of Chicago, were the other Commanderies entered.

The performance of Raper's "drill squad" on this occasion was a great surprise to the spectators to whom it was then unknown. The judges awarded the first place to Detroit No. 1, their score being a perfect 100 points, with fifty-seven men in line; Raper made 975_8 points, with twenty-eight men in line, and thus received second place, and Monroe No. 12 received third place with a score of 95 points with forty-one men in line.

Prizes for proficiency were not offered in advance to induce attendance, but were the voluntary gifts of Oriental Commandery No. 12 of Cleveland, as evidence of their appreciation of the visiting Commanderies. Raper's gift was a magnificent Libation Service, now enclosed in a suitable case and one of the many trophies to be found in the Asylum.

The officers and other Sir Knights who were the active participants in that event were: Eminent Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle, Captain; Sirs Henry C. Adams, Lieutenant; Frank P. Wade, Lieutenant; William C. Anderson, Christian Brink, Samuel D. Brear, Austin H. Brown, Frederich Borst, Morris M. DeFrees, James W. Dryer, Albert Gall, Will J. Kercheval, Henry C. Mc-Farland, John R. Nickum, John G. Pendergast, Samuel P. Porter, Jacob W. Smith, Joseph W. Smith, Joseph Staub, John D. Steep, Preston C. Trusler, Frederich J. Vogt, Edward F. Gall, David C. Hughes, Albert Izor, William W. Weaver, Frank Wilson and Samuel A. Johnson.

Until a few months ago Sir Frank Wilson was the only living member of this team, but he recently died while still a member of Raper Commandery, and a resident of Detroit, Michigan.

In giving an account of the parade and drill, among other incidental features connected with that Conclave, the Cleveland Post had this to say of Raper's performance: "Unfortunately Raper had only a part of her best drilled members on the ground. and as numbers were taken into consideration in awarding honors, to this fact is attributed the failure to carry off first prize. The second however, was good enough for the first trial in a competitive drill. Without the least exaggeration it can be said that a more whole-souled, well informed and honorable body of men were not met on this occasion than Raper Commandery of Indianapolis, and this is not only the opinion of one person but of all who met them. They are an excellent representation of what Knights Templar should be. In the grand parade Raper distinguished itself by the first-class movements displayed, and much was expected of the Hoosier boys when they marched onto the field of contest; all of their movements indicated that they were not strangers to the work before them; the evolutions were such as to delight everyone who witnessed them; the sword manual elicited further admiration and applause from the spectators. No one was surprised when a beautiful Libation Service was awarded to them as the second prize."

At the stated Conclave following the return of the Commandery from Cleveland many congratulatory letters and resolutions were reported by the Recorder as having been received from near-

ly all the Commanderies attending the Triennial Conclave. One from Hugh De Pageas Commandery No. 10 of Buffalo, New York, being in substance typical of all of them:

"Resolved, That this Commandery hereby heartily congratulates Raper Commandery on the excellence of its discipline as exhibited at the drill on the 29th day of August, ult., and its eminent success on the field on that memorable day, regardless of the contestants. This Commandery fully concurs in the award of the honors and prizes on that occasion. Courteously, Christopher Fox, Commander."

Energetic efforts were at once put forth to recruit eligible Sir Knights to the "drill squad" sufficient to have an adequate number to meet any requirement necessary for any future contest should occasion arise, and preliminary steps were taken looking to the formation of a Drill Association, as an auxiliary organization to the Commandery. Forty additional Sir Knights were soon after enrolled and in October of the following year the first "Raper Drill Association" was organized with Sirs Austin H. Brown, President; Past Grand Commander Hunt, Vice-President; H. S. Watson, Secretary; Frank P. Woolen, Treasurer, and Nicholas R. Ruckle, Commandant. The rules and regulations adopted were very rigid in many particulars, and among them it was provided that "each Sir Knight may attain the necessary proficiency in Templar Tactics and Drill, and to qualify himself to take his place in ranks of the Commandery in public, he shall attend nine practice drills before he can take a place in Commanderv ranks; provided, those attending drills shall be confined within six months; if any Sir Knight after qualifying for a place in ranks does not attend four drills when called within six months, he shall be sent back to "squad drills," that he may again qualify for a place in the ranks. The Commandant shall designate such squad drills as may be necessary or convenient for purposes of qualification, and excuses for absence at practice drills shall be considered only from members over fifty years of age."


These rules evidently caused a prompt and regular attendance at practice drills, which contributed largely to the efficiency of the Commandery on all public occasions, and especially at Triennial Conclaves in later years, and gave to it its reputation as a welldrilled body.

Eminent Sir Henry Adams was continued as Eminent Commander in 1878, and Sir Martin H. Rice became Eminent Commander in 1879. Early in this year announcement was received fixing the date of the Triennial Encampment to be held in Chicago in 1880, and extending a general invitation to all Commanderies to attend. This invitation was at once accepted, and shortly afterward preparations were begun by Raper Drill Association to enter the competitive drill, should such a feature of the Conclave be arranged. It should here be understood that the Drill Association at this time included nearly all resident members of the Commandery, who were also the factors in all its activities, and practice drills were frequent during the entire year.

The Commandery celebrated St. John's Day, June 24th, by a pilgrimage to New Castle, Indiana, with forty-two Sir Knights in line, and with the officers and members of New Castle Lodge and other neighboring lodges, Sir Knights from Knightstown, Muncie and Anderson Commanderies participated in the exercises of the day.

Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle was elected Eminent Commander, and the year 1880 opened with bright prospects for the future, and ended with twenty-one accessions to the Commandery's membership. The national and state political campaigns of the year interfered somewhat with greater activity in the Commandery's affairs, because of the candidacy of several of the principal workers for local offices, and also with the necessary preparation of the Drill Corps for the competitive drill, which was advertised and attractive prizes offered for proficiency at the Chicago Triennial Conclave to be held in August. Strict discipline and intensive practice soon showed good results. Sixty-eight Sir Knights and many ladies besides about two hundred other persons, accompanied by Beizenherz' Military Band, left the city for Chicago on August 16. Unfortunately rain and intense heat so interfered with the great parade, which occurred on the following day, that it was not completed. On the 18th the contest for the prizes took place. Raper No. 1, Damacus Commandery No. 1 of St. Paul, Minn.; Reed Commandery No. 6 of Dayton, Ohio; De-Molay Commandery No. 12 of Louisville, Ky.; Monroe Commandery No. 12 of Rochester, N. Y., and St. Bernard No. 35 of Chicago, were the contestants. Raper's representatives on the field were:

The program of drill consisted of thirty-five movements with a possible score of 350 points. Raper scored 315 points and won the first prize. The nearest competitor was DeMolay No. 12 of Louisville, Ky., with a score of 268 points. Monroe No. 12 of Rochester was ruled out because of alleged refusal to obey instructions.

The first prize was an Eminent Commander's sword and belt. The sword is made of tempered steel, etched in relief with nu-

merous devices of the Order, and with the inscriptions "First Prize, Chicago, 1880." The hilt is a masterpiece of the goldsmith's work, designed in succession of Templar emblems set with diamonds, rubies and emeralds. At the guard of the blade the hilt represents Constantine's tent and dream, the arms terminating in triangles, richly embossed with cross and crown and surmounted by a Knight in full armor in the second movement of drawing his sword, which forms the body of the hilt. The scabbard is solid nickel, embossed and relieved with ornamentation and appropriate emblems. The sword is valued at six hundred dollars and became the unconditional property of Raper Com-The belt of red leather-plush is also elaborately decormanderv. ated with gold bullion in special design; the buckle and hanger hooks are made of gold, with the straps of the same material as the belt.

This prize is carefully guarded and is now enclosed in a glass case and may be seen by all admitted to our Asylum.

Accompanying the first prize was a special trophy—a champion standard which Raper received, and which was to be held by the victors, subject to a challenge from any Commandery for its possession within sixty days, the challenging Commandery naming the time and place for the contest. This standard or banner was valued at one thousand dollars.

This victory was due to Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle's admirable instructions as drill master and his rigid rules of discipline, and he received his reward in the glorious triumph of the Commandery Drill Corps.

The expenses incidental to this pilgrimage amounted to \$884.25. The members of the Drill Corps and other Sir Knights contributed \$990.50, and after all expenses had been paid, the balance, \$106.25, was donated to the Commandery. Later the Citizens' Committee, appointed to extend a welcome home to the victors, decided that rather than arrange for a general reception and banquet in Masonic Temple, a more appropriate testimonial would be a "purse of money," and \$558 was raised and presented to the Drill Corps, which was gratefully received, and placed in the Commandery Treasury. These donations permitted the Commandery to free itself for the first time in its history of all in-

debtedness, and an inventory of all its assets at the close of the year showed a valuation of five thousand dollars.

The Commandery or Drill Corps was given an ovation and hearty welcome on its return from Chicago. A Reception Committee of citizens was headed by General Dan McCauley, John M. Finch, and Harry Craft. Beizenherz' Band, the Indianapolis Light Infantry, and other civic uniformed bodies formed in line to meet the victors at the Union Station, from which a parade over the principal streets was witnessed by crowds of spectators lining the route, and amid sounds of cheering moved to the Asylum in Masonic Temple, where an address of welcome was made by General McCauley, which was responded to by Colonel Ruckle.

Within thirty days a challenge was received from St. Bernard Commandery No. 35 of Chicago for possession of the Standard, with the statement that they believed they should have received it when it was awarded to Raper. The contest took place at the old Exposition Grounds, which is now Morton Place, on September 5, 1880. Much interest was manifested in the result of this event which was shown by the large attendance of Templars and delegations of citizens from towns in Indiana, Illinois, Kentucky and Ohio. It was expected that scoring for points would be close, and the friends of each Commandery expressed confidence in the ability of their favorite to win the trophy. Eight thousand and more had gathered in the grand stand and grounds surrounding it, where a small admission fee was charged to defray the expenses.

Raper drilled first, and cheer upon cheer greeted the champions as they marched in perfect cadence on the field. The drill was an honest one in every respect and ample time was given to perform each evolution. However, they failed to complete the program prepared by the judges within the prescribed time.

St. Bernard was received with the same generous applause. After marching upon the field in fine shape, the standard guard was dismissed by the Captain General during the inspection, thus leaving seven men less than Raper had used. By cutting short each evolution it succeeded in executing three more movements than Raper, which added several points to St. Bernard's advantage. It was generally thought by the audience, military men and competent judges, that Raper was still entitled to the honors of

the championship, but the decision of the judges awarded the Standard Banner to St. Bernard.

So confident were the Sir Knights of Raper that they had not been fairly treated in this contest that they favored another trial, and at the next conclave of the Commandery it was decided to challenge St. Bernard, that they might regain the coveted honor and prize.

The challenge was at once accepted by St. Bernard, and the sec-The ond contest between them occurred at Chicago in October. competitive drill took place October 9, and Chicago Commandery No. 19 escorted Raper to the base-ball grounds, where the two Commandants were furnished with the drill program. The entertainment began at three o'clock in the afternoon, which gave St. Bernard an opportunity for three hours' practice before going on the field, as Raper, being the senior Commandery, was first to drill. The exhibition did not meet the expectation of the spectators and was not as near perfect as that given at the first contest in Indianapolis on September 5. St. Bernard sustained her first record and was again declared the victor and retained the Standard, subject to further challenge by any Commandery.

As an evidence of the Knightly regard of the victors for the vanquished, the first toast offered at the banquet and entertainment following in the evening was "In honor of Raper." It is worthy of special mention that a spirit of Knightly courtesy was manifested by all participants in this event during Raper's brief sojourn in Chicago.

Only five Sir Knights who were members of this Drill Team are now known to be living, four of them being still members of Raper Commandery. They are Chalmers Brown, Stephen Gray, Samuel J. Hillman and Vestal W. Woodward; the fifth member, Romeo L. DePuy, is a member of Wabash Commandery.

These three contests of Aug. 18th, Sept. 5th and October 9th, 1880, caused much comment by several Masonic journals, two or more discouraging and denouncing them, while others took a more liberal view and encouraged the practice. One editorial with "Are Drills Desirable" as a heading, appeared in defense of the custom, and is worth reprinting. It is as follows:

"The good results and benefits of competitive drills appear to be manifold. The citizen is of necessity relied upon to swell the

ranks of the Army in case of insurrection, rebellion or war; and indeed to form an army and fight our battles. The better he is prepared to perform such patriotic duties in emergencies, the greater will be the saving in blood and treasure. It seems to be the duty of every able-bodied American to qualify himself to meet every demand upon him as a citizen and patriot, and to be proficient in the alphabet of military knowledge or drill is of great importance; not to be so is almost criminal. That it is left to his own increases the individual responsibility. In semi-military societies he can gain much practice in the formation and movements of bodies of men that will materially augment his efficiency and usefulness if called into service as a soldier, facilitating the organization of an army to repel any that may threaten our thousands of miles of border."

The drill exercise in moderation, frequent but not prolonged, is personally beneficial, and if properly conducted is a social delight, forming and cementing friendships. The Commandery of Templars that is continuously well drilled, performs a patriotic duty, if the foregoing is correct, and will surely be greatly benefited socially in its increased attendance at meetings and in the impressiveness of its work; and it is little hazard to assert that its readiness to help the needy frater, or follow his remains to the grave is never wanting, while its appearance in public at funerals or otherwise, brings commendation and respect.

On the contrary, a Commandery that pays no attention to drill is inefficient along the lines referred to, and when a detachment from it appears in public or elsewhere it provokes ridicule if not contempt. Its meetings are poorly attended, its rendition of ritualistic work is less impressive, bordering on the farcial. There is nothing perhaps more conspicuously awkward than undrilled, ununiformed Templars, who are sure to invite unfavorable criticism.

The competitive drill is an object lesson, and raises the ambition of others to seek to do as well as the best; besides, it affords a proper entertainment for participant and spectator. Americans do not have enough of such spectacles, but spend their lives in money-making or struggles for subsistence. Therefore, why not let those who like the drill indulge in it without criticism and en-

courage them, for they will be stronger and better men in the relaxation from wearing toil, more competent to meet demands of the country, and better physically for every day duty.

Albert Gall served as Eminent Commander for the year 1881. The Thirty-Third Anniversary of the Commandery was observed on May 13th. Muncie Commandery was the special guest on that occasion, and after a short parade from the Union Station, all repaired to the Asylum, where an elaborate banquet was served, with many ladies, and a musical program and dancing followed.

The Drill Corps, being at that time both proficient and popular with all classes of citizens, upon the request of the city council and the mayor and other Indianapolis officials, gave an exhibition drill on the afternoon of October 25 at Garfield Park, which was crowded with spectators. On the following day the same team made a pilgrimage to Cleveland, Ohio, upon invitation extended by Oriental Commandery to participate in conferring the Orders of Knighthood upon a large class of candidates. The year 1881 closed with a membership of one hundred and eighty-one.

Early in 1882 the Commandery decided to send the Drill Corps or its representatives to the Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment, to be held in San Francisco, California, during August of the following year, and preliminary preparations were begun. All necessary committees were appointed and practice drilling was renewed with great vigor by the Drill Corps. It was not long after this that the Commandery decided that it would not be responsible for any expense incurred, and all committees were discharged and tentative preparations for the pilgrimage abandoned.

The Drill Corps, as such, therefore, assumed all responsibility, and at once began its preparations for the great military tournament which was held the first week in July at the Exposition Grounds in Indianapolis in 1882, which was promoted for the purpose of raising funds sufficient to pay the expenses to San Francisco in 1883. This tournament excited much interest throughout the country wherever a Commandery or military organization was located, and resulted in the attendance of five welldrilled Commanderies and twenty-three crack military companies entering for competitive drills for prizes, from New York, Lousiana, Missouri, Illinois, Tennessee, Arkansas, Ohio and Indiana.

It was evident from the first that the citizens of Indianapolis were in accord and sympathy with the purpose of the event. They cheerfully co-operated with the general committee, composed of the Drill Corps team, and other Sir Knights, with results far beyond the most sanguine expectations of the citizens as well as the visiting organizations. The net proceeds from the event amounted to more than twelve thousand dollars after all expenses and the generous prizes had been paid. In this manner ample funds were raised, and all expenses of the members of the Drill Corps were paid to San Francisco and return in 1883.

A very pleasant surprise came to Raper Commandery on July 11, 1882, when Morris R. Eddy of Cincinnati, Ohio, presented to the Commandery a large portrait in oil of Sir William Raper, who instituted the Commandery and which bears his name. Accompanying the portrait was a communication which stated that "it was presented by Mr. Raper to the father of the writer while they were residing upon terms of great intimacy together in Cincinnati sometime about the year 1856." "May I add personally that the impression formed by me of 'Brother Raper,' as he was usually called in our Methodist home, remains firmly established in my memory, and Raper Commandery could not be better named than after him, who in his dealings with his fellow-men was ever honest and upright, and who in social qualities had the rare faculty of bringing sunshine with him wherever he might go, and who wherever he might be was not ashamed to acknowledge and affirm his faith in the divine Christianity that guided him throughout so many years of his life."

A pilgrimage was made to Muncie, Indiana, on September 25, 1882, by forty Sir Knights of the Commandery, to witness the conferring of the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross upon thirtyeight candidates. A band accompanied the party, and a short parade in company with Muncie Commandery No. 18, was followed by a sumptuous repast before the Asylum ceremonies began. Twenty-two additional members were enrolled in 1882, and the year closed with a total membership of 199.

Joseph W. Smith was Eminent Commander in 1883. On August 11, thirty-three Sir Knights and their wives and friends, left this city for the Golden West. After more than a week's interesting journey in their own specially equipped train, stopping

whenever and wherever they desired, they arrived in San Francisco. Enroute Sir Nicholas R. Ruckle, the Commandant, was compelled to return home because of a death occurring in his fam-

ily. He rejoined the party in time to command the Drill Corps in the competitive drill, but labored under more or less difficulty, as

two other Sir Knights who were members of the team also failed to appear at the critical time. Those composing the team in this contest August 25, were: Sirs Nicholas R. Ruckle, Commandant, Henry C. Adams, Christian Brink, R. L. Browning, Charles H. McCurer, Henry H. McGaffey, Charles F. Meyer, Thomas J. Morse, Chalmers Brown, John T. Brush, Stephen D. Crane, Romeo L. DePuy, William O. Devay, Harry Fowler, Albert Gall, George W. Griffith, Robert Gordon, R. H. Lowe, Edward L. Williams, David Nicholson, Theo. Pfafflin, Charles H. Reynolds, Jacob W. Smith, Joseph W. Smith, Richard L. Scarlett, Ira Webb, John B. Van Tilburg, Herman Weinberger and Vestal W. Woodward.

This was one of the most remarkable of all of Raper's contests and experiences. It was not only short two officers and two other Sir Knights in line on the field, but it defeated its old rival. St. Bernard of Chicago. In this contest also, Raper's score was eight points higher than its nearest competitor, which was discounted ten points because of the absence of the two Lieutenants, and this gave to DeMolay Commandery, of Louisville, Ky., the choice of the trophies. The fraters of DeMolay, recognizing the fact that Raper really made the highest score, most generously selected what was intended to be the second prize, and thus Raper secured the magnificent trophy, the gold-silver mounted Knight on horseback, on an onyx column forming the base, and now occupying a prominent place in the Asylum. This trophy was considered such a work of art that it was given much prominence by newspapers in different cities. It was loaned by the Commandery for exhibition purposes at the Cincinnati Exposition in 1884, and at St. Louis in 1886, for the benefit of a proposed Masonic Widows' and Orphans' Home for the State of Missouri.

Four members of this team are still living, three of whom continue on the roster of the Commandery—Chalmers Brown, Charles F. Meyer and Vestel W. Woodward; the fourth, Romeo L. DePuy, now holds his membership in Wabash Commandery No. 37.

DeMolay Commandery of Louisville, on the same train on her way home from San Francisco, bearing the first prize, lay over one train at this point and were entertained by Raper Commandery, with LaFayette Commandery No. 3, at the Denison House. At home the victorious Knights were given a royal reception, in

which the Commanderies from Jeffersonville and New Albany participated. Mayor Jacob delivered an address of welcome, which was responded to by Col. Sir George W. Northup and Judge Barnett. Past Grand Master Robert Morris was then introduced, and after offering a few congratulatory remarks, read the following poem:

> Welcome, welcome, Knights so lucky, All our hearts are yours today.
> "Welcome home," cries old Kentucky, Proud to meet our DeMolay.
> Going forth with souls undaunted, How we longed to see you win;
> All our wishes now are granted— Hail, victorious, home again!

'Twas no common thoughts inspired you On that conquering summer day;
'Twas a hero's spirit fired you, Greatest hero, DeMolay!
When our Beauseant waved in glory, And the sunlight kissed your steel,
Surely 'twas his deathless story That aroused your utmost zeal!

Yes, the martyred Jacques, Grand Master, Dying in a shroud of flame, Pure as virgin alabaster, Left a vigor in his name; Yours the inheritance that hour When your swords without a stain, Irresistible in power, Conquered on Francisco's plain.

Welcome home! In all this treasure, Marvels of the latter day,
Nothing yields exquisite pleasure Like our victors—DeMolay.
Rest you now; enough of glory; On Kentucky's brightest page
Golden letters tell the story
Of your conquering pilgrimage.

When the news came from San Francisco that Raper Commandery had been awarded the second prize in the competitive drill, the feeling among Sir Knights and citizens generally in this city was to give the victorious Knights a grand ovation on their return. Meetings were called when it was found that they would arrive on Sunday, September 1. An effort was then made

to change the time of their arrival, and the matter, which was not settled for several days, interfered with making full arrange-The time selected was Monday, September 2nd., and ments. a committee was appointed to meet the party at LaFayette. At that point LaFayette Commandery, No. 3, fifty strong, were in waiting with a special car filled with refreshments for the weary pilgrims. The car was attached to the train, and all had a most enjoyable time until they reached this city. At the depot an immense crowd of people were in waiting, who cheered lustily when the train arrived. The Indianapolis Light Infantry and the "Home Guard" of Raper Commandery, in full uniform, and headed by Beisenherz Band, were in waiting as escort, and the line of march was taken up Meridian Street to Circle Park, where the following address of welcome was made by Sir Judge John A. Holman:

"Sir Knights of Raper drill corps, we all desire to minister to your comfort and happiness today, and I can not better begin the good work than at once surprising you with the announcement that you are not long to be detained at this place. We have all heard the old soldier tell of the struggle required to repress the unruly and increasing impatience they experienced when, after a prolonged absence at the front, they approached nearer and nearer to their homes, and it would savor of unkindness, as well as be in questionable taste, were I so consume the happy moments of the present by a too lengthy expression of our sentiments of welcome.

"There are some things, however, which we must be permitted to notice. During the nine years just passed you have participated at every conclave, and have returned from the field of contest victors over the worthiest of rivals. You went to the Forest City unheralded and unknown and by your merit simply won for yourselves the second place in the list of the contestants, and attracted the attention of the country. Three years later you marched with quiet confidence into the arena of Chicago, and before the eyes of the greatest multitude ever gathered on a similar occasion, exhibited your exquisite prowess in the drill, and brought away as a trophy of your excellence the jeweled sword which was intended for the bravest and the best. And three years after you girded yourselves for the fray again, and thousands of

miles away from the scenes and connections of your daily lives, knocked at the Golden Gate as foemen no longer obscure and subordinated, but feared and respected for your accomplishments. We saw you leave us on this last occasion with regret that the field of contest lay so far away as to be inaccessible to the thousands desiring so much to be witnesses of the scene, but believing and feeling that there was that aggregate of winning elements in your proficiency in the code, your personnel of rank and file, and your individual determination to prevail, which would leave the keeping of the name and fame of Raper with hands and hearts most trustworthy. We waited in anxious expectation, and as the eventful day drew near there were those who went to the wires and sent the subtle fluid across the continent with messages of encouragement and trust. And when the good tidings came at last, your brilliant achievement became on every hand the topic of remark, and to your brethren the source of the liveliest pleasure and gratification. It was not merely the exultation and triumph of an order. The whole city was proud and happy, and every corner of your State responded. You were looked upon as citizens of Indiana, displaying her advancement and cultivation in a contest before the representatives of the whole country. Your success meant her honor; your failure her sorrow. She would not have it understood that she had forgotten the art of war in the quietude of peace, and she turns today to her temples and her militia with pride at their excellence and confidence in their futurity."

On Tuesday following, a great reception and banquet was given the Drill Corps team at the Asylum, to which all Commandery members and their ladies and many citizens were invited, and the quarters in the Masonic Temple were crowded. The large banquet tables were loaded with choice wines and fruits of every description from California, in addition to our own home-grown products.

Early in the following year the Drill Corp disbanded and turned over to the Commandery \$780.35, which was the balance it had left from the funds accumulated by promoting the military tournament of 1882. And while this ended its activities in competitive drills, it attended several Triennial Conclaves in later years and gave exhibition drills.

RECENT TRIENNIALS

Saratoga—1907

You have read of the accounts, public activities, and exploits of Raper Commandery during a long period of years, and we now take up some of the events occurring in the present century. After an interval of twenty-five years many new conditions have arisen and the personality of Raper Commandery has greatly changed, but the "spirit of seventy-six" is still evident, with at least equal enthusiasm. After the 1883 contests in drilling at Triennial Conclaves, more or less antagonism to such features caused different Masonic publications to criticise and strongly condemn the practice.

Not until 1907 were competitive drills renewed and at the Thirtieth Triennial, held at Saratoga Springs, New York, in August, five of the former active Commanderies, composed of Sir Knights, three with practically no experience in competitive drill, attended and participated in that particular feature of the Conclave. Raper's contingent comprised such Sir Knights as found it convenient to attend, and was not selected because of their especial fitness by virtue of special training. In this day the teams would not bear a very rigid inspection creditably.

Of the Sir Knights, but three had any experience, and that with the Indiana National Guard. The entries were: St. Bernard No. 35, and Englewood No. 39, of Chicago; Ivanhoe No. 24, of Milwaukee; Columbia No. 2, of Washington, and Raper No. 1. Thirty minutes were allowed in which to complete the program. Raper drilled first and was well received by the large concourse of spectators assembled on the famous Jockey Club race-track. Ruckle's Templar tactics were followed. The judges were United States Army officers and well-known tacticians.

H. Meyer, Gustave A. Haller, John W. Swanton, Morgan, Frank Canaan, Wm. H. Roberts, James T. Peake, O. T. Hamilton and Harry Farmee.

The score reported by the judges was St. Bernard No. 35, 96.4%; Columbia No. 2, 90.8%; Raper No. 1, 89.8%; Englewood No. 39, 89%; Ivanhoe No. 24, 76.9%. The trophies were a silver

punch bowl, a mahogany hall clock, and a highly carved oak clock with chimes. The successful Commanderies selected their own prize, and as the present Masonic Temple was then under construction, Commandant Conde selected the elegant clock now occupying a corner in our Asylum parlors, as a suitable ornament for Raper's quarters when the Temple was ready for occupancy.

Naturally the success of Raper led to an embryo movement, having in purpose the formation of a Drill Corps. In the following year, April 8, the first meeting was held, to which all members likely to be interested were invited. Fifty-seven Sir Knights attended, and on April 11 the organization was perfected by the election of Sir Elmer F. Gay, President; Sir Ed. H. Meyer, Vice-President; Charles M. Cross, Treasurer; Howard Kimball, Secretary; Sir Henri F. Conde, Commandant; Gus A. Haller, First Lieutenant; E. J. Scoonover, Second Lieutenant. Sirs Haller and Kimball served but a short time, when Sir Robert L. Moorehead was elected Second Lieutenant, and Sir Frank Bowers succeeded Sir Kimball. Sir Scoonover retired in 1923, and Sirs Cross and Bowers remained in office. Thirteen of the original members have died, fifteen have become non-residents, and sixteen are still on the roster as active members.

Chicago-1910

Tradition and vivid memory tell us that the first hard-fought battle for Templar honors occurred just thirty years previous to the 1910 Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment in Chicago, where again Raper's Drill Team won first place and the highest rating for proficiency in Templar tactical evolutions. The parade on this occasion, Aug. 10, 1910, is said to have been the most magnificent and imposing feature of its kind ever held or witnessed in the United States, and the more than three hundred Indianapolis citizens who were present to witness it, and to encourage Raper Drill Corps in its efforts to uphold its reputation as a well-drilled body in the competition drills, were well rewarded for their time and co-operation.

The members of the carefully selected and hardened team, after strenuous weeks of daily practice, entered the contest with a firm belief that none could defeat them. Their faith in themselves was well founded. The personnel of the team was: Sirs Henri T. Conde, Commandant; Robert L. Moorehead, First Lieutenant; Edward

The contest began on the morning of August tenth. As the various teams entered the National League base ball park they were greeted with rounds of applause, but the greatest and most prolonged enthusiasm of the crowded grand stand spectators was evidenced when Raper Drill Team came onto the field soon after the noon intermission. There was a crowd of Indiana Sir Knights and ladies to lead the cheering for the Hoosiers, but as they went through evolution after evolution in perfect formation, apparently without effort, no cheer leaders were needed. The big crowd was impressed with the perfection of drill, and after completing the program with time to spare, the team marched off the field amid a storm of cheering and yelling, "They surely win."

In the evening, with all competing teams in line assembled in front of the Auditorium and Congress Hotels on Michigan Avenue, the report of the judges was announced and a moment later there was not a spectator on the street who didn't know that Raper Drill Team had won first honors. The percentages of the seven contestants were: Raper Commandery No. 1, 92.3%; Hanselman Commandery No. 16, Cincinnati, 87.3%; Oriental Commandery No. 31, Kansas City, 87.2%; Ivanhoe Commandery No. 24, Milwaukee, 85.5%; Kenosha (Wis.) Commandery No. 30, 84.9%; Beauseant Commandery No. 8, Baltimore, 79.9%, and Mt. Olivet Commandery No. 12, Wichita, 78.2%.

The trophy, a magnificent gold and silver punch bowl and center piece, stands about forty inches high and twenty-four inches across. It was the center of attraction at Raper's quarters in the Stratford Hotel, where from eight to twelve o'clock Raper Com-

mandery held "open house" until forced to close the doors, owing to the crowds desiring to see the piece and congratulate the Sir Knights over their success.

Upon their return from Chicago, the team was given a rousing reception, really worth special mention, both sincere and elaborate in details, but time and space here forbid.

Denver-1913

The Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment held at Denver, Colorado, during the month of August, 1913, was another successful event in Raper's history. The long distance to travel and the expense incidental to that pilgrimage, did not lessen the enthusiasm for the summer outing nor the determination of Raper's Drill Corps again to beat the world in accumulating additional trophies for adorning the Asylum parlors and adding fresh laurels to its own history. All plans for the visitation were made early in the intervening years. Sir Robert L. Moorehead succeeded Sir Henri T. Conde as Commandant, the latter having become a non-resident of Indiana, and weekly practice drills began with several of the former team and new recruits. Their drills continued somewhat irregularly during 1912, but with the opening of 1913 real hard work began for the Sir Knights who expected to be selected for the team. In July thirtynine Sir Knights sojourned at Bethany Park that they might engage uninterruptedly in practicing and receive needed coaching. This outing proved to be a great benefit to many. On Aug. 2, an exhibition drill was given at Washington Ball Park, and the opinion that the team could not be excelled in their movements was expressed by Army Officers from Ft. Harrison.

The enthusiastic scenes and incidents preliminary to and during the drilling contest at Chicago were largely repeated by the throngs of spectators filling the great stadium in which the drilling took place on August 14th. Sixteen teams were entered for the contest, but only five trophies were awarded. The rating by

the judges was Raper No. 1, 99.26%; Englewood No. 59, Chicago, 98.29%; Joliet No. 1, 97.68%; California No. 1, San Francisco, 95.93%, and Chicago No. 19, 95.13%. Raper also received from her former rival, St. Bernard No. 35 of Chicago, one of the unsuccessful Commanderies entered, the prize Champion Pennant which should have been surrendered at Chicago in 1910.

The prizes were awarded in the evening at the Auditorium, and there was great enthusiasm as the judges read their report.

Raper's prize, now encased and to be found in the Asylum parlors, consists of a mammoth sterling silver and gold punch bowl, with thirty goblets and ladle of the same metals, valued at \$5,000.00. After the award of the prizes the Sir Knights of Raper, led by Creatore's great band, and followed by Grand Commander Joseph I. Iback, and Eminent Commander Rumpler, Past Commanders Jacoby, Leach, Clancy, and many ladies, paraded to the Karserhott Hotel, where a reception was held. Thousands of guests composed of defeated drill teams, friends and Grand officers, attended. Speeches and congratulations, singing and serenades continued until the wee small hours in the morning.

Los Angeles—1916

The World War covering the year 1916, interfered to some extent with the number of Sir Knights of Raper Commandery and their friends attending the Thirty-third Triennial Encampment held at Los Angeles, California, June 17th to 24th. Several of the experienced members of the Drill Corps in former teams were unable to leave home because of their relation to the National Guard which rendered them subject to be called into active service by the Federal authorities; a few others were allowed a short furlough, but they were subject to immediate recall. Fortunately the order to return for duty was not issued until the close of the day of the competition drill. The team entered the contest under a severe strain, which affected the result. The competition drills were held on Wednesday, June 21st. There was no official program, each team being permitted to follow the specifications of the drill regulations promulgated and

used by their particular jurisdiction. The standing of the prizewinning teams and their percentages of perfection and trophies


awarded were: Englewood No. 59, Chicago, 91%, the first prize, valued \$5,000.00, a silver Libation Service; Raper No. 1, 87%, the second prize, value \$5,000.00, a bronze-enameled Lecturn for Asylum use; Newton (Kas.) No. 9, 80%, third prize, value \$2,000.00, a Hall Clock; Oriental No. 35, Kansas City, Kas., 78%, fourth prize, value \$1,000.00 in cash. In addition souvenirs of French gray finish bookracks ornamented with Templar emblem and native California scenes in relief, were given to each member of the competing teams. Raper was penalized ten points from the judges' rating, contrary to the rules of the General Committee regarding the use of tactics of their own jurisdiction.

The pilgrimage was under the control of Eminent Commander Isaac P. Pickett and a special committee. En route several hours' stops were made at Kansas City, Mo., Newton, Kansas, Santa Fe and Albuquerque, New Mexico, the Grand Canyon of the Colorado, and Riverside, Cal., where entertainment had been provided by the local Commanderies and citizens. At Los Angeles an elaborate and interesting program of entertainments and sight-seeing had been prepared and was thoroughly enjoyed by our party. Side trips to the Magic Island of the Pacific, Catilina, Long Beach, Pasadena, Mount Lowe, and many other interesting places of renown were a revelation to many. Miles and miles of the streets of Los Angeles were beautifully decorated in American colors and Templar black and white, intermingled with which were elaborately colored panels, electrical crosses, coats-of-arms, and other emblems. Twice during the week gorgeous floral and electrical pageants typical of and representing the "Flight of the Huns," "Summer Songs in Flower Land," "Events in Templar History," were presented by the California Naval Militia. Many other unusual features to please the eye were frequently in evidence and it seemed like a "Mid-Summer Night's Dream."

The return trip was made by different routes as personal desire prompted; the larger number, however, returned via the Royal Gorge, Manitou, Pikes Peak, Garden of the Gods, Colorado Springs and Denver route, all conceding that they had experienced a delightful outing and the time was well spent. "See America First" was on the lips of every one when relating to the stay-athomes an account of the pilgrimage.

Philadelphia-1919

The Thirty-fourth Triennial Conclave of the Grand Encampment of the United States was held in Philadelphia, Pa., begin-

ning September 6th, 1919. This triennial was said to be the Knights Templar tribute to every soldier, sailor and marine who

served with the colors during the World War and more than a World's Peace Jubilee celebration. In 1917 the preparations for the event was stopped, and when renewed but little publicity was given to the work necessary then under contemplation, and this may have influenced the belief that the Triennial arrangements would not be as complete as in former years. The "City of Brotherly Love" finally realized that energetic action was necessary. Assuming that every contingency would be met as in other cities under the guidance of Eminent Commander Franklin L. Bridges and his committee, headed by Sirs Hurst H. Sargent. James W. Hopkins, Clyde E. Titus and Charles Apostal, Raper's representatives, and other Sir Knights and Indiana friends. started on their pilgrimage on September 6th, by special train, arriving at Philadelphia on the evening of September 7th. They were much surprised when scarcely a decoration in honor of the event was to be seen; at no time during the week was there much real evidence of enthusiasm over the hourly arrival of visitors. The impression left on many from other States was that the reception was quite chilly. Regardless of this, however, a very interesting program of receptions, visits to neighboring resorts, the Navy Yard, Independence Hall, Fairmount Park and the site of the Centennial Exposition of 1876; a historical, industrial and patriotic pageant portrayed by floats and tableaux, a naval water-carnival on the Schuylkill river and display of fireworks, had been prepared.

The competing teams which entered and received a rating of percentage of perfection by the official judges were: Englewood Commandery No. 59, Chicago, 97%; Raper No. 1, 96%; Chicago No. 19, 89%; Lansing No. 25, of Lansing, Michigan, 85%; Washington No. 4 of Newport, Rhode Island, 82%; Cyrene No. 39 of Rochester, New York, 79%, and Cyrene No. 7 of Camden, New Jersey, 72%. The prizes awarded in the above order were all the same—Hamilton watches valued at seventy-five dollars, and each member of the Commandery teams drilling was presented with one.

Headquarters of the Grand Commandery of Indiana were established at the Bellvue-Stratford Hotel, where the usual courtesies of such functions were extended. Raper's headquarters at the Philadelphia Hotel was the resting place for Indiana visitors, and the rooms were frequented by many Sir Knights from other States.

New Orleans—1922

Raper Commandery took a larger delegation to New Orleans to attend the Triennial Encampment of 1922 than had previously

participated in such an event. Under the guidance of Eminent Commander Brandt C. Downey, nearly two hundred happy and contented Hoosiers comprised the party; a happier and more hopeful lot of enthusiasts never landed in New Orleans.

The particular motive that induced this unusual attendance was the hope of recovering that of which they were unjustly deprived at Los Angeles and Philadelphia in 1916 and 1919, the first honors, by virtue of the highest score of points in competition drill, as rendered by the official judges.

Raper's recently organized Drum and Bugle Corps, consisting of some twenty-five artists, in their line of march headed Raper's well-known Drill Corps.

In the competive drill Raper's team showed its fine metal and demonstrated that none were more perfect. That was the verdict of the United States Army officers who judged and rated it, giving a score of 98.2 out of a possible hundred points. The arbitrary action on the part of one member of the local committee for alleged consideration of some kind, directed a different degree of efficiency, which the judges could not prevent. Being Knightly sportsmen as they had always shown themselves to be, Raper's team took their medicine and had to like it, at the same time entering a legitimate protest. All of them returned home disappointed but not discouraged, fully realizing that justice is sometimes blind beyond recovery. The judges' ratings of all Commandery teams entering this contest were:

Raper No. 1, 98.2% (penalized 15 points because of no wheelings, which are not required by Indiana tactics); Englewood, Chicago, 96.69%; Columbus No. 63, Chicago, 95.04%; Chicago No. 19, 93.26%; Los Angeles No. 9, 93.06%; St. Bernard No. 35, Chicago, 92.66%; Wisconsin No. 1, Milwaukee, 92.16%; Golden West No. 43, Los Angeles, 92.13%; Kansas City No. 10, 91.16%; Zion City No. 2, Minneapolis, 91.16%; Ivanhoe, No. 24, Milwaukee, 86.09%; San Antonio, No. 7, 85.09%; Lincoln Park No. 65, Chicago, 85.09%; Mt. Calvary No. 1, Omaha, 79.07%; Oriental No. 35, Kansas City, 79.05%; Streator No. 30, Streator, Ill., 74.03%; Mt. Olivet No. 12, Wichita, 73.08%; Ft. Worth No. 19, Ft. Worth, Texas, 71%; Dallas No. 6, Dallas, Texas, 68%; Woodlawn No. 31, Birmingham, Alabama, 65.04%.

All through the hospitable South, as well as in New Orleans, visitors and representatives voiced their sentiments against the action of the local chairman in depriving Raper's Drill Team of its justly earned honors.

SEATTLE, WASHINGTON, 1925

Raper Commandery was invited by Grand Master Leonidas P. Newby, Grand Master of the Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the U. S. A., to become a part of his escort to the Thirty-Sixth Triennial Conclave held in Seattle, Washington, and the

members of Raper Commandery and their families were a large proportion of the escort train for the Grand Master.

As the trip was made to the Pacific coast, entertainment was abundant in the different grand jurisdictions, and one of the bright spots of this trip, never to be forgotten by those who participated, was the three-day tour through Yellowstone Park.

On arriving at Seattle, the Grand Master was escorted to his hotel by his party with Raper's choir and drill corps singing and executing maneuvers along the line of march through the streets, which were filled with interested onlookers and local knights, the latter having formed a square at a "present" about each side of the Olympic Hotel, which was the general headquarters of the Encampment.

Raper Commandery was again represented at this Triennial by its Drill Team, and the team entered the competitive drills with the new tactics, which were required to be used by all competing teams. This was a move in the right direction, making all drills uniform and much easier for the Judges to give fair and intelligent decisions. These drills were more difficult than in preceeding competitive drills, for the reason that no team knew what schedule they were to drill until thirty minutes before going on

the field. It was especially trying on the Captains of the teams because it was difficult to maneuver their men so that all movements could be executed as per schedule in the allotted time.

In drawing for position Raper Drill Team was second and entered the competition at the University Stadium on Wednesday morning, July 29.

In view of the fact that practically fifty per cent of the men that comprised the drill team had never participated prior to that time in a competitive drill, the team made an exceptional showing, as the score below indicates, and much praise is due Captain George W. Thompson and his officers in being able to get sufficient men to go two-thirds of the way across the United States, enter a new form of competitive drill, and make the score that they did.

The score percentages of the fourteen contestants who finished were as follows: California No. 1, San Francisco, Cal., 93.44%; Woodlawn No. 76, Chicago, Ill., 92.06%; Ivanhoe No. 24, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, 90.18%; Raper No. 1, Indianapolis, Indiana, 89.16%; Mount Olivet No. 12, Wichita, Kansas, 89.00%; Oakland No. 11, Oakland, Cal., 88.98%; Golden West No. 43, Los Angeles, Cal., 88.58%; Wisconsin No. 1, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, 86.84%; Columbia No. 2, Washington, D. C., 85.78%; Los Angeles No. 9, Los Angeles, Cal., 85.62%; Mount Calvary No. 1, Omaha, Nebraska, 85.57%; Dallas No. 6, Dallas, Texas, 84.22%; Galilee No. 38, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, 79.54%; Newton No. 9, Newton, Kansas, 79.46%.

The prizes were presented at the Armory on Thursday evening, July 30th, to the first five winning teams. The Grand Master, Leonidas P. Newby, made presentation speeches to all the Captains as the trophies were distributed.

Raper Commandery's prize was a Mounted Knight made in bronze; also a white ribbon on which was inscribed in letters of black "Fourth Prize." This ribbon was given for the purpose of attaching it to our Commandery's Beauchant.



At the conclusion of the Conclave the Knights of Raper Commandery returned to their homes, some first going as far north as Alaska, and some by southern routes through San Francisco and Los Angeles. Others, under the guidance of Eminent Commander Oscar L. Pond and a special committee, visited Victoria and Vancouver, where they boarded the good ship "Margaret" for Prince Rupert, a sail of some seven hundred miles through the "inside channel" to the Alaskan border, where Raper's special Canadian National train was waiting to carry the party through the Canadian Rockies to Jasper Park, in which two days were spent viewing this wild wonderland, after which short visits were made to Edmonton, Winnipeg and Duluth. A pleasant feature of the trip was a religious service held on board the steamer upon Sunday, en route to Point Rupert. Sir Knights formed the choir. acted as ushers and took up the offering, which was given for a hospital at Vancouver and placed in the hands of the officers upon the boat. Sir Knight and Grand Prelate Rev. Lewis Brown preached an appropriate and fitting sermon. The service was an inspiration throughout and thoroughly enjoyed.

All returned with the often repeated expression of Grand Master Newby that "This is the best Triennial ever held."

THE CHOIR



THE CHOIR

At the October stated conclave in 1922 Generalissimo Calvin W. Busch moved that an attempt be made to organize a volunteer choir in Raper Commandery, and Eminent Commander Brandt C. Downey appointed Sir Knight George W. Kadel, Eminent Sir Franklin L. Bridges and Sir Knight Albert J. Natho to undertake the work. Sir Knight Clarence Carson continued at the organ. These four able and enthusiastic Fraters speedily brought together other self-sacrificing and loyal Knights and the music of the Orders soon became a joy to the officers and much pleasure to the membership. One of the first moves by the choir was to furnish appropriate music for the Order of Malta. So successful was this music for the Commandery work that no Commander since 1922 has ever presented that most beautiful and solemn order except in full form.

As the membership increased the choir perfected a business organization with by-laws and officers and took its place as an established part of Raper Commandery. Eminent Sir Bridges was elected first president; Albert J. Natho, secretary and treasurer; George W. Kadel, director and Clarence Carson, organist. The Choir, having mastered the ritualistic music for all the orders of the Commandery, turned its attention to other music in anticipation of carrying the Banner of Raper into new environments. At its first public appearance in May 1924, a concert was given in the Grand Lodge Hall. The program was well received and favorably commented upon by musical critics. The Choir was invited to join the National Federation of Music Clubs in 1924 and has since retained its membership, taking an active part in the convention program held here at the Lincoln Hotel in the fall of 1924. The Commandery activities, preliminary to the last conclave at Seattle were ably supported and forwarded by the Choir, which gave two numbers on the entertainment program, one in the fall of 1924, and the second the following spring. The Matinee Musical Society invited the Choir to furnish the male section of the chorus in an evening of Grand Opera under the direction of Hugh McGibenv in May, 1926. During the years 1924, 1925 and 1926, the Choir accompanied Eminent Commanders Neu, Pond and Thompson to several Blue Lodge banquets, among which were visits to Logan, Capitol City, Centre,

Ancient Landmarks, North Park and Calvin Prather Lodges. As early as the annual election in January, 1924, the Choir decided to go to Seattle with Raper Commandery and lend its support and entertainment for Raper, Indiana Templarism, and its gifted son, Leonidas P. Newby, who was the Grand Master. As a part of Raper's delegation on the Grand Master's pilgrimage the Choir was privileged to represent our beloved Commandery in the special Sunday morning service at Hennepin Avenue Methodist Church in Minneapolis, at the opening Grand Encampment service at Seattle, at the banquet of the Grand Master in Spokane, Washington, the Indiana banquet, the Grand Master's banquet, and at several other functions by invitation of Grand Master Newby in Seattle. In this way Raper Commandery earned new laurels in a unique and distinctive field of Commandery activities.


By invitation, the Choir gave an entire evening's concert of sacred and secular numbers in the Christian Church at Noblesville, Indiana, May 3, 1925, and on Sunday, August 9, 1926, the Choir again appeared at Noblesville in an afternoon and evening concert on the opening day of the Noblesville chautauqua. On Sunday, August 29, 1926, the same program was given at Brazil, Indiana, at the close of the Brazil annual chautauqua.

In the winter of 1922-23 the Choir built slowly and much of the ritualistic music was rendered by Sir Knight Kadel, who has served continuously as director. Sir Knight Louis Hemrich, of Greenfield Commandery, was a tower of help in the early days. Sir Knight Carson has served as our organist from the beginning. The membership in these early days consisted of Eminent Sir Bridges, Sir Knights Natho, Marquette, Pauli, Robertson, Snider and Rotz, some of whom resigned, and others joined, including Sir Knights John Watson, Harry E. Smith, Harry L. Richardson, Peter Lambertus, Carey E. Chapman, Edward J. Kappler, Samuel Lewis, Brandt C. Downey, Henry L. Hurst and Omar S. Hunt.





BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES





Sir Knight Wm. H. Raper for Whom Raper Commandery No. 1 Was Named.


REV. WILLIAM H. RAPER

Of the personal history of Eminent Sir William H. Raper, in whose honor Raper Encampment was given its name, it is related that he was born in a block house in Western Pennsylvania September 24, 1783, and while yet a minor served gallantly as a soldier and officer in the War of 1812. He began his services in the ministry in 1818, filling many hard fields and occuping, as well, distinguished Conference appointments in the Methodist This active work in the ministry continued for more Church. than thirty-four years, then ceasing because of failing health and advancing age. He received the Lodge degrees of Masonry in Harmony Lodge No. 6 of Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1830; the Chapter degrees in Dayton, Ohio, in 1836; and the Orders of Knighthood in Reed Encampment No. 6, of Dayton, Ohio, in 1846. He served his Encampment one year as its Grand Commander, and the Grand Encampment of Ohio as Prelate. At the time of instituting Raper Encampment he was the Deputy of the Grand Master of the General Grand Encampment appointed for that purpose, and delivered the Dispensation to the Encampment on May 17, 1848. A splendid and striking full length oil-painted portrait of Sir Raper presented to Raper Commandery on July 11, 1882, by Morris Eddy of Cincinnati, Ohio, now hangs upon the walls of Raper Commandery Asylum in the Masonic Temple and is still in a good state of preservation, although showing the effects of the fire which destroyed the former Masonic Temple in 1906. No one can look upon the picture without feelings of reverence and admiration. The portrait, as it hangs in silent dignity and in its life-like power, tells well of the nobility and of the stately original, for he was over six feet in height and squarely built. Few men possessed a more commanding personality.

In February, 1852, in company with other distinguished Methodist ministers, he visited the town of Aurora, Indiana, where he preached his last sermon. He soon afterward started by steamboat for his home, Cincinnati, but when near that city was stricken with apoplexy, and in a few brief hours the story of his exit was told; he died in Cincinnati February 11, 1852, in the sixty-ninth year of his age. *Requiescat in pace*.

REV. BENJAMIN TAYLOR KAVANAUGH

Eminent Sir Benjamin Taylor Kavanaugh was the second Grand Commander of Raper Encampment No. 1. He was a member of the Kavanaugh family, quite prominent in Methodism of Kentucky the first half of the nineteenth century, and a brother of Bishop Kavanaugh of that state, and was born early in 1816. Of his Masonic career but little is known, although it has been discovered that he affiliated with Melody Lodge No. 2 of Plattsville, Wisconsin, by dimit from some Lodge in Missouri, afterwards serving as Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Wisconsin in 1844-45, and became a member of Apollo Encampment No. 1, K. T., of Chicago, Illinois, August 30, 1847. He had evidently held membership in some Chapter of Royal Arch Masons previously, as records disclose that he became a resident of Indianapolis and affiliated with Indianapolis Chapter No. 5 and served as High Priest in that Chapter for one year beginning May 20, 1846. He was one of the applicants for the Dispensation to institute Raper Encampment. He acted as Grand Commander pro tem from June 7, 1848, to May 24, 1849, when by appointment of Abel C. Pepper as the first Grand Commander, who was designated to serve as such in the Dispensation, and because of the resignation of Sir Pepper, he was elected and served as such until January 25, 1851, when the first officers under the charter were installed and the Encampment was regularly constituted. On January 27, 1851, he dimitted from Raper Encampment, removing to St. Louis, Missouri, and from there to Houston, Texas, where he re-engaged in the practice of medicine while continuing his ministerial work and acting as editor of the Masonic Monitor, a monthly magazine published in Houston in 1856. Yellow fever scourged the State of Texas in 1867, and death removed his wife and two children. When well advanced in years, quite feeble, and with his eyesight lost, in 1881, he returned to his native state in or near Lexington, Kentucky, where his boyhood friends and remaining members of his relatives rendered his last days tranguil and happy. His death occurred late in 1881.

GOV. JAMES WHITCOMB

James Whitcomb was the first petitioner to receive the Orders of Knighthood in Raper Encampment, which were conferred upon him May 18th and 20th, 1848, at the stated conclaves held for that purpose. Born at Windsor, Vermont, on December 1, 1795, he came to Indiana and located at Bloomington in 1824; and there during the same year, in Monroe Lodge No. 22, he became a Master Mason and served as the Worshipful Master of the Lodge, and in 1825 he was its representative in the Grand Lodge of Indiana. He was one of the first members of Indianapolis Chapter No. 5, and served as its Secretary from the date of its formation, February 3, 1846, to the end of that year. He also served as Re-

corder of Raper Encampment from June 7, 1848, to January 8, 1849.

He was twice elected Governor of the State of Indiana, serving from December 6, 1843, to December 26, 1848, when he resigned, having been elected United States Senator for Indiana. He is said to have been one of the most picturesque characters the State ever produced. He was a member of the Methodist Church and an active worker in its cause; vice-president of the American Bible Society, an organization to which he was a liberal contributor, as well as to Asbury University of Greencastle, an institution he favored in many ways and to which he willed his valuable library.

He died in New York City October 4, 1852, while serving as United States Senator from Indiana, and his remains were returned to Indianapolis and buried in old Greenlawn Cemetery, where the State erected an Indiana stone monument to his memory to point out the spot where lies one whose influence upon public sentiment is felt even at the present day. Later his remains were removed to Crown Hill Cemetery.

In reminiscences of early days, Past Eminent Commander Kavanaugh, who then lived in Texas, relates that "We had some very distinguished men of the State who were zealous and efficient members always on hand at the proper time, and Governor Whitcomb deserves special mention. He was our Generalissimo as well as our Recorder and did not deem it beneath his dignity to serve in any capacity; and he was usually assigned the duty of delivering the final charge after conferring the Order of the Temple, and before reading the charge he delivered an extemporaneous address to the newly created Sir Knight portraying in the most forceful and impressive manner the nature, genius and exalted character of the Knightly Orders and the solemn and enduring obligations resting upon every Sir Knight to carry out in his life and deportment the sublime principles of our professions. The effort was visible in every case, for the newly created Knight was made to feel that these were not idle ceremonies, but that all life's aims and purposes should thereafter be governed by the magnanimous principles of Christian Knighthood."

JOHN S. BOBBS

Eminent Sir John S. Bobbs was born at Green Village, Pennsylvania, on December 28, 1809, and died at Indianapolis May 1, 1870. He left a record of life fragrant with kindly deeds and memorable for its usefulness. He bequeathed two thousand dollars to establish the Bobbs Free Dispensary for the benefit of the suffering poor of Indianapolis, which was managed for a number of years by the First Medical College of Indiana. This Dispensary, of which he was a professor in 1850 and its president in 1859, is still in operation. In his practice as a physician and surgeon he was ever ready to give his time and efforts to the relief of the destitute and helpless without the hope of fee or reward.

WILLIAM SHEETS

Eminent Sir William Sheets was born in Birkit County, Virginia, in 1803. Removed to Indiana and located at Madison in 1817. He was made a Mason in Solomon Lodge No. 27 in Madison in 1824. Was a member of Madison Chapter No. 1. He represented that Lodge in the Grand Lodge in 1829. In 1831 he presided as Grand Master and at that session was elected as Grand Master, but did not attend the session of 1832. In 1847 he was elected one of the Grand Lodge Trustees to superintend the purchase of the ground at the southeast corner of Washington and Tennessee Streets and the erection thereon of the first Masonic Temple at Indianapolis. Nearly the entire supervision of that task devolved on him and for nearly twenty years he devoted much time and energies to the prosecution of the work. In the year 1832 he was elected to the office of Secretary of State and removed to Indianapolis to assume the duties of that position. to which he was again elected in 1840, thus holding in all a term of eight years. He died at Indianapolis March 4, 1871, age sixtyeight years. He became a member of Raper Commandery May 24, 1848, and was elected and served as Captain-General in 1851, Generalissimo in 1852 and Eminent Commander in 1854.

EPHRAIM COLESTOCK

Eminent Sir Ephraim Colestock was born November 3, 1803, at Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, removing to Indianapolis in October, 1836, where he resided until his death, which occurred June 27, 1871, caused by a fall from the framework of the Marion

County court house while superintending its construction. He was engaged in business as a contractor and builder and erected several public buildings, among which were the old deaf and dumb asylum, the old market house, and others which are now replaced with modern structures.

He was made a Master Mason in Centre Lodge No. 23, of Indianapolis, in 1839, and elected Worshipful Master in 1843 and again in 1857; he was High Priest in Indianapolis Chapter No. 5, Royal Arch Masons, in 1851 and 1852; he received the degree of Royal and Select Master in Indianapolis Council No. 2 in 1856, and received the Orders of Knighthood in Raper Commandery No. 1 in 1848, and was elected Eminent Commander in 1856 and re-elected each year up to 1869. In 1857 he was elected Most Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, declining a second term in 1858. During his several years of service as Eminent Commander, eighty-five members were added to the roster of Raper Commandery.

He was buried in Crown Hill Cemetery, with full Masonic ceremonies, conducted by and under the auspices of Centre Lodge No. 23, Adoniram Grand Lodge of Perfection, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite, and Raper Commandery.

ROGER PARRY

Eminent Sir Roger Parry was born December 21, 1829, at Hollywell, Fluelsture County, Wales. Died April 17, 1909, in Indianapolis. Became a Master Mason in Marion Lodge No. 35, June 18, 1859, and served as Worshipful Master of that Lodge during the years 1864, 1865, 1866, 1867, 1886, 1887, 1889, and as Grand Steward of the Grand Lodge of Indiana for the years 1889 to the time of his death. He became a member of Keystone Chapter No. 6, Royal Arch Masons, and of Indianapolis Council No. 2, received the Orders of Knighthood in Raper Commandery, and served as Eminent Commander from 1869 to 1871, and as Grand Captain of the Guard in the Grand Commandery of Indiana. As a ritualist he is said to have been versatile, constant and faithful to a marked degree, and by his exemplary life and character attested to the efficiency of the ethics and teachings of Masonry. His funeral occurred at Crown Hill Cemetery under the auspices of Marion Lodge, with Raper Commandery acting as escort.

NICHOLAS RANDALL RUCKLE

Eminent Sir Nicholas Randall Ruckle was born in Baltimore. Md., May 28, 1838, and died in Indianapolis, May 4, 1900. He was made a Master Mason in Centre Lodge No. 23, August 10, 1866: a Roval Arch Mason in Indianapolis Chapter No. 5, May 17. 1867: a Royal and Select Master in Indianapolis Council No. 2. March 18, 1872; a Knight Templar in Raper Commandery No. 1, December 24, 1867. He was active in the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite from February 2, 1867, where he received the Ineffable Degrees in Adoniram Lodge of Perfection, and the Chivalric Grades and Prerequisite Degrees March 22, 1867. He was made a Sovereign Inspector General of the 33rd Degree June 17, 1870, an Active Member of the Supreme Council for Indiana September 27, 1883, Deputy for the Supreme Council in Indiana November 3, 1884, and remained in that office until his death. He also served as Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Indiana in 1892, was Worshipful Master of Centre Lodge No. 23 in 1871, having dimitted from that Lodge to Pentalpha Lodge No. 564, and he served that Lodge as Worshipful Master in 1877. He served as Eminent Commander of Raper Commandery in 1872, 1875 and 1880, and as Captain-General in 1877-1878, 1881-1882, 1891-1892, and 1895-1896, during which years some of the most strenuous days of competitive drilling were experienced, establishing a degree of tactical efficiency not excelled by any other Commandery in that period.

Colonel Ruckle, as he was familiarly hailed, was a practical printer, having learned that art in the old Indianapolis Journal office previous to the Civil War between the States of the Union. He served as Captain in the Civil War, volunteering in the 11th Indiana Regiment. Early in 1865 he was promoted as Colonel of the 148th Indiana Regiment and mustered out after more than four years of hard service as a soldier.

In civil life he served two terms as sheriff of Marion County, four years adjutant general of the State of Indiana, also one term as president of the metropolitan police, and later as chairman of the board of safety of the City of Indianapolis. He was the first Captain of the Indiana Light Artillery.

JOHN G. PRENDERGAST

Eminent Sir John G. Prendergast was born in Bedford County, Pennsylvania, March 19, 1834, and with his parents came to Indianapolis in 1842. For nearly thirty years he was engaged in carpentering, later as a contractor. In 1871 he superintended the construction of the present Marion County Court House. After several years work thereon the building was completed and he became construction superintendent of the present State House, and in 1878 was appointed Chief of the Indianapolis Fire Department. serving in that capacity for three years. In 1893 he was appointed and held the office of Building Inspector through the administration of Caleb S. Denny, Mayor of the city for four years. He was an active member of the Meridian Street M. E. Church, the Odd Fellows and the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite. He became a member of Mystic Tie Lodge No. 398, Keystone Chapter No. 6, and Raper Commandery No. 1, serving as Eminent Commander in 1876. After a long illness his death occurred in Indianapolis January 20, 1905.

ALBERT GALL

Eminent Sir Albert Gall was born at Green Bay, Wisconsin, November 23, 1842; received his education in Antwerp, Belgium. his father having been appointed consul at Antwerp, Belgium. He removed with his family to Indianapolis in 1858. Albert Gall attained a high degree of educational accomplishments, especially in the German and French languages. He was prominent in commercial affairs for nearly forty years, and was twice honored by election as Treasurer of the State of Indiana. He was raised a Master Mason in Mystic Tie Lodge No. 398 of Indianapolis, September 14, 1874; exalted a Royal Arch Mason in Keystone Chapter No. 6, October 15, 1874; he was greeted as a Royal and Select Master in Indianapolis Council No. 2, November 1, 1875, and received the Orders of Knighthood in Raper Commandery No. 1, January 8, 1875. After continuous service in subordinate offices from 1876 to 1880, he was elected Eminent Commander in 1881. and afterwards served as Treasurer in the Council and Commandery from 1901 until his death, which occurred October 13, 1905. He took the several degrees of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in 1875 and was crowned an honorary member of the Supreme Council in Indianapolis in 1905.

AUSTIN H. BROWN

Eminent Sir Austin H. Brown was born in Milroy, Indiana, March 19, 1828, and died in Indianapolis January 1, 1903. He was raised a Master Mason June 7, 1869, in Centre Lodge No. 23 of Indianapolis, serving in various stations beginning in 1873, and as Worshipful Master in 1879 and 1880. Dimitting from Centre Lodge January 7, 1885, he affiliated with Capital City Lodge No. 312, of which he was a member until his death. He was exalted to the Royal Arch Mason degree in Indianapolis Chapter No. 5, April 21, 1871, and received the cryptic degrees in Indianapolis Council No. 2, October 4, 1875. He was Knighted in Raper Commandery January 8, 1875, and served as Prelate in 1879, 1880 and again in 1894 and 1895. He was elected Eminent Commander in 1882.

JOSEPH W. SMITH

Eminent Sir Joseph W. Smith was born in Sheffield, England, October 3, 1837, emigrating with his parents in 1845 and locating at Richmond, Indiana. He was made a Master Mason in Capital City Lodge No. 312 of Indianapolis, September 26, 1866; a Royal Arch Mason in Keystone Chapter No. 6, November 26, 1870; a Royal and Select Master in Indianapolis Council No. 2 in 1872, and received the Orders of Knighthood in Raper Commandery No. 1 April 22, 1873. He was Worshipful Master of Mystic Tie Lodge in 1873-1874, High Priest of Keystone Chapter in 1887-1888, Eminent Commander of Raper Commandery in 1883, and was Treasurer of the Grand Commandery of Indiana from 1885 to 1889. He died in Indianapolis after a long illness on November 30, 1901, while serving as Secretary of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite.

JACOB TOMLINSON BRUSH

Eminent Sir Jacob Tomlinson Brush was born at Hornellsville, New York, June 5, 1845, and died November 26, 1912, near St. Louis, Missouri, while enroute to Pasadena, California. In his seventeenth year and while a clerk in a Boston clothing store, he enlisted in Battery K, First Artillery, of New York volunteers, serving until mustered out at the close of the Civil War. In 1875 he located in Indianapolis and at once became active in the "When" clothing business and the fraternal and social affairs

of the city. He also became interested almost to a passion in local base ball matters and in 1902 became President of the National League franchise of New York City, and reached the height of his ambition in that direction. He was a member of Hornellsville Lodge No. 331, of New York; exalted as a Royal Arch Mason in Keystone No. 6, May 8, 1879, and was created a Knight Templar in Raper Commandery No. 1, November 11, 1879. In the latter he was quite active and in 1887 he was elected and served as Eminent Commander. He was also active in the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite and was Potent Master in 1888-89 and was exalted a member of the 33rd degree. His funeral services were held in St. Paul's Church and were conducted by Rev. Lewis Brown, on November 29, 1912, and his burial was in Crown Hill Cemetery, Indianapolis.

JACOB W. SMITH

Eminent Sir Jacob W. Smith was born in Ripley County, Indiana, March 19, 1856, and died October 19, 1909, while apparently in good health. He became a Master Mason in Mystic Tie Lodge No. 398 of Indianapolis February 12, 1872; served as Worshipful Master during the years 1876, 1881, 1885, 1886, and as secretary 1878-1879; he was exalted in Keystone Chapter No. 6, February 13, 1873, and elected and served as Excellent High Priest in 1884 after having served in all subordinate offices of that Chapter. He was greeted a Royal and Select Master in Indianapolis Council No. 2, January 5, 1874, and filled the office of Recorder for a number of years. He received the Orders of Knighthood in Raper Commandery No. 1, May 4, 1873, and served as Eminent Commander in 1887; was afterward Recorder from 1889 to 1906. He was recognized as a thorough ritualist and his daily life was an exemplification of Masonic teachings. His civil career was largely devoted to accounting and bookkeeping. He served for a long period of years as secretary of the Indianapolis Board of Trade.

BYRON K. ELLIOTT

Eminent Sir Byron K. Elliott was born in Butler County, Ohio, September 4, 1835, and died at his home in Indianapolis April 19, 1913. During the Civil War he was Captain of the 132nd Indiana Volunteers and served as Adjutant on the staff of General

Robert Milroy. He was raised as a Master Mason in Centre Lodge No. 23, June 17, 1867, dimitting February 14, 1882, to Pentalpha Lodge No. 564. He was exalted as a Royal Arch Mason in Keystone Chapter No. 6, May 6, 1864, and was created a Knight Templar in Raper, September 16, 1884, where he served as Eminent Commander for the year 1889. He received the grades of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite March 25-27, 1879, and was crowned an honorary member of the Supreme Council of the 33d Degree September 23, 1884. He served as Most Wise Master of Indianapolis Chapter of Rose Croix in 1883 to 1904. He was an efficient and impressive officer in all the bodies over which he presided. As a conscientious and active member of the Second Presbyterian Church he lived the life he earnestly and faithfully taught to those who came under his influence.

In public life he was for four terms—from 1865 to 1869 and in 1875—elected city attorney of Indianapolis; in 1870 he was elected judge of the Marion County criminal court. In 1876 he was elected judge of the superior court of Marion County. He was elected judge of the supreme court of Indiana in 1886, serving for twelve years, and afterward engaged as a writer of law and a lecturer in the law department of Northwestern University of Illinois, Butler College and Depauw University of Indiana. He was buried in Crown Hill Cemetery.

WILLIAM JAMES MCKEE

Eminent Sir William J. McKee was born Dec. 12, 1858, at Madison, Indiana, and was educated in the public schools of that city and Shefield Scientific School of Yale University, in the class of 1875. His father was Robert S. McKee, who was born Jan. 8, 1825, in Tully Cavey, County Down Patrick, Ireland. His mother was Celine Elizabeth (Lodge) McKee, who was born in Madison, Indiana, January 28, 1826.

The Indianapolis News in an editorial says:

"William James McKee, dead at the age of seventy-two, was thoroughly military both in temperament and attitude. His close association and interest in the Indiana National Guard for more than a quarter of a century reflected the characteristics of the man. He had a high respect for honorable authority; he believed in order as a prerequisite for progress, and the possession of citizen-

ship implied to him as it should to all, very definite obligations to the state and to society. His passing therefore means a loss to Indianapolis, in which he lived so long, and to all the people of Indiana.

"As brigadier-general of the National Guard in the state, to which position he was named in 1893, he displayed executive and organizing ability of a high type. Two years later he was raised to the rank of major-general, and at the outbreak of the Spanish-American war he was appointed a brigadier-general of volunteers in the United States army. He saw service till 1899, commanding various divisions of the first and second army corps. After that conflict he continued his work in military affairs and was made field commander of the National Guard in this state. His wholesouled devotion to the public welfare cannot be questioned and throughout his whole career, either as civilian or soldier, he was prompted by ideals in accord with the best traditions of the state and nation.

"Since 1914 he has been on the guard's retired list, but his through knowledge of military details made him an asset in any discussion of national defense. In other fields, too, he was capable. The Masonic Order to which he belonged, had conferred on him its thirty-third degree, reserved for members of more than ordinary distinction. Born and reared in Indiana, he was a Hoosier to be proud of, one that always stood four-square on the rock of truth and honor."

General McKee was exceedingly active in Masonic work. He was raised a Master Mason Dec. 17, 1877, in Centre Lodge No. 23, and remained in full fellowship to the day of his death; he was exalted a Royal Arch Mason December 17, 1882, in Keystone Chapter No. 6, and served as high priest thereof in 1890; he was greeted a Royal and Select Master February 3, 1883, in Indianapolis Council No. 2; and was created a Knight Templar April 17, 1883, in Raper Commandery No. 1, and served as Commander in 1890 and 1891. He received the several grades of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in the valley of Indianapolis in January, February and March 1883, and served as Master of Ceremonies in Adoniram Grand Lodge of Perfection in 1886; as Second Lieutenant-Commander of Indiana Consistory in 1889; and First Lieutenant-

Commander and Commander-in-Chief from 1910 to 1919 inclusive. He was crowned an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council 33, N. M. J., September 19, 1893 at Chicago.

Impressive services marked the funeral of this Eminent Brother on Saturday, December 26, 1925. Rev. Sir Lewis Brown, Prelate of Raper Commandery and of the Indiana Grand Commandery and Rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, conducted the services. Burial was in Crown Hill Cemetery.

And thus was laid to rest a splendid type of man and a Mason, a leader in civil and military affairs, one endowed with superior qualities of mind and heart, an affable gentleman, a warm friend and a positive character for the right. Living, he was highly esteemed; dead, his memory will be cherished and his life emulated.

HENRI TULL CONDE

Eminent Sir Henri T. Conde was born in Wailuka, Hawaiian Islands, January 16, 1851. His father was Daniel T. Conde, born at Charlton, New York, and his mother was Andelucia (Lee) Conde, born in Vermont. During Sir Knight Conde's residence in Indianapolis, in 1877, he became interested in the affairs of the Indiana National Guard and he filled all the ranks therein from Private to Colonel. He was Major in the 158th Indiana Volunteers during the Spanish-American War in 1898. After being mustered out he was recommissioned as Major of 2nd Infantry in 1900, promoted to Lieutenant-Colonel in 1912, and to Colonel in 1914. He retired from service in 1916.

His Masonic record is as follows: He was made a Master Mason February 1, 1886, in Mystic Tie Lodge No. 398, and served as Master in 1899; he was exalted a Royal Arch Mason June 29, 1886, in Keystone Chapter No. 6, and filled all offices therein except that of High Priest; he was created a Knight Templar September 16, 1886, in Raper Commandery No. 1 and served as Commander for the years 1902 and 1903. He was Captain of Raper Drill Team in 1910, winning first prize at the Conclave in Chicago, and he served as Grand Commander of Indiana in 1919; he received the grades of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite in the Valley of Indianapolis during the months of May and June, 1890, and was crowned an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council, 33°, September 15, 1914, at Chicago, Illinois.

He was president of the Indianapolis Masonic Temple Association from 1905 to 1910, during which time the present Masonic Temple was erected and completed.

Thus lived and served a most exemplary man and Mason. He was essentially military in his bearing, possessed of a tireless energy and the same unvarying courtesy to all; a man without an enemy, and one who by his daily walk and conversation exemplified the sublime teachings of Freemasonry in their best sense. He was faithful to all requirements, firm in his convictions yet lenient toward the opinions of others, loyal to his brethren, and zealous in his attention to his Masonic connections.

He lived an honored citizen, a courageous soldier, an upright man and a zealous Mason; he died "and his brethren mourn."

His body arrived in Indianapolis on July 7 and funeral services were held on the afternoon of July 8, 1926, by the Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of Indiana, the Rev. Sir Lewis Brown, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church and chaplain of the Grand Commandery, officiating. Interment was at Crown Hill cemetery.

CALVIN WILLIAM BUSCH

Eminent Sir Calvin W. Busch was born in Galion, Ohio, March 19, 1860, and died at his home in the city of Indianapolis, Indiana, after an illness of two years, February 7, 1925. The funeral Services were held at his residence on North Illinois Street, Indianapolis, Tuesday, February 10, 1925, with Rev. Sir Lewis Brown, our Prelate and Rector of St. Paul's Church in charge of the religious services.

He had a notable Masonic record, having been for forty-two years an active worker in the various Masonic lodges of Indianaoplis. He was raised a Master Mason in Centre Lodge No. 23, Indianapolis on April 23, 1883, from which he dimitted to become a charter member of Veritas Lodge No. 608, Brightwood, in 1896, and its first master. He served as Worshipful Master of Centre Lodge for the years 1889 and 1892, and of Veritas Lodge for the years 1896, 1897, 1898, 1903 and 1904. In 1911 he was elected treasurer and held that office until his death. He was exalted a Royal Arch Mason in Indianapolis Chapter No. 5, July 28, 1905, and served as High Priest in 1910; he was greeted a Royal and Select Master in Indianapolis Council No. 2, December 4, 1905,


and served as Illustrious Master thereof in 1911; and he was dubbed a Knight Templar in Raper Commandery No. 1, Indianapolis, October 28, 1913, and served as Commander in 1923.

He received the several degrees of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite in the valley of Indianapolis, in October 1897, and February 1898, and was crowned an Honorary Member of the Supreme Council, 33°, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, at Pittsburg, Pa., September 19, 1916. He served as Thrice Potent Master of Adoniram Grand Lodge of Perfection, Indianapolis, for the years 1914 and 1915, and as Commander-in-Chief of Indiana Consistory, Indianapolis, from May 1922, till his death.

The influence of Brother Busch in Masonic circles cannot be measured in mere words, for words are but empty vessels in contrast with his deeds. His vocation and his fraternity engaged his full time . To these he gave his energies, unostentaciously, faithfully, impressively. He endeared himself to all those with whom he came in contact, by his sincerity, his honesty, his charity, and in his departure the Order he loved so well and served so zealously will lose a conscientious and time-tried servant. May he rest in peace.
